## **Historical Fiction**

Sometimes a good story is the best introduction to Civil War history. Diane Rogers who uses the pen name of D. L. Rogers, has volume one of a Civil War trilogy which she is introducing on February 9, 2008 at the Cass County Library in Harrisonville from 1:00 – 4:00 p.m. The first volume is called *Tomorrow's Promise: Survival of the Plains.* She describes her books as "historical fiction based on historical facts." She has woven her story into the backdrop of the Civil War and the Missouri-Kansas Border War. "The book," writes Civil War historian Jim Beckner in the foreward, "is as historically accurate as many history books."

A Vernon County native, Ellen Gray Massey, grew up surrounded by the history of the Civil War on the Missouri/Kansas border. She tells the story of Lettie Worthington and her family in "Little Dixie" in northwest Missouri near the Missouri River. Her book is called *Brothers Blue & Gray*. The Nevada *Daily Mail*\_says that the book is "a memorable, intricate and well-told tale of a Missouri family dealing with life and war with courage and fortitude. A very good read for all ages." This Month in Our Local History

Harold Dellinger is keeping busy these days as Vice-President of the William Clarke Quantrill Society and most recently as a monthly contributor to the Winding River E-Mail newsletter of history events. He will be reviewing highlights of the history of the Kansas City-St. Joseph corridor and surrounding communities to be run in the newsletter the first week of each month. You can access it at www.windingriver.com. For instance, our meeting date of February 13<sup>th</sup> in 1866 was the first daylight bank robbery in peacetime perpetrated at Liberty. Missouri when the Clay County Savings Association was victimized by some 12-15 men, mostly ex-Confederate guerrillas. This is the first robbery attributed to what became known as the James-Younger Gang.

We thank Frank McMillian of Smithville, MO for sponsoring the Winding River newsletter and for attending our January meeting. He has been a resource for Dennis Myers and Beverly Shaw as they work on an expanded website for the Round Table.

## "Quindaro"

"Quindaro" is a new play about an 1856 settlement in what is now Kansas City, KS which was established by abolitionists and the Wyandot tribe as a beacon for runaway slaves. It is a production of the UMKC Department of Theatre and is staged at the H&R Block City Stage in Union Station from Feb. 9 - 24, 2008. "Are they still down there, does it still exist?" asks a young boy gazing 150 years in to the past, deep into the bending waters of the Missouri River at the edge of a crossing called Quindaro. For here once stood a crossroads of hope for runaway slaves, for whites and for Native Americans alike, where for a brief and special moment in our history, people united in the face of all odds to found a new, free American town. "Quindaro," a new play about that place and time, answers the young boys question with a resounding and reassuring, "Yes, Quindaro exists, as still does hope."

Another play at Union Station from February 5 to 23, 2008 is presented by Theatre for Young America and is called "In the Footsteps of Freedom with Harriet Tubman." Born Aramintha Ross, a slave in Maryland in the early 1800's, Harriet Tubman became the courageous rescuer of hundreds of slaves via the Underground Railroad. Tubman's remarkable life of over 90 years was packed with amazing adventures, bravery against all odds, and an unwavering commitment to the freedom and dignity of African Americans. Sometimes called "Moses" or simply "The Conductor," Tubman could neither read nor write but spoke eloquently at numerous anti-slavery and women's rights rallies in the North. This play is appropriate for 2<sup>nd</sup> grade and up.

## **Civil War Pillar for Independence**

Thanks to the unwavering support of Wendy Shay, Preservation Director for the City of Independence, and the volunteer hours donated by Mike Calvert, Dennis Myers, and Vicki Nave, we now have a beautifully produced and historically accurate brochure called *Civil War Sites of Independence* which was published by the Independence Tourism Department. Copies hot off the press were distributed at the January meeting and we will have some available on February 13<sup>th</sup>. You will be interested to know that the cover shows a picture of Kevin Wells, son of Karen and Sonny Wells, riding horseback at a Civil War reenactment.

We would like to thank David Jackson for his article in the January 5-6, 2008 edition of *The Independence Examiner* where he listed the top ten

historical sites for a driving tour of Eastern Jackson County. Number 4 was the Lawson-Moore Home and Number 2 was the Little Blue Battlefield.

# **Burnt District Monument**

At our Open Round Table in January, 2008, Jim Beckner brought to our attention that there is an effort to raise \$25,000 to erect a 17 foot tall monument to the removal of the civilians from Jackson, Cass, Bates, and Vernon Counties as a result of Order No. 11. When they returned to their homes, they saw a desolate landscape with only chimneys left to mark once flourishing farms and homesteads. The monument will be made of brick in the shape of a chimney, and individuals and groups are able to purchase bricks for \$65 each with an inscription. The monument will be placed on the lawn of the Cass County Justice Center in Harrisonville, Missouri and will have Reconciliation Plaza behind it.
