



I don't know how many of you happened to see the article in the October 15<sup>th</sup> Kansas City Star in the Going Places section. Written by Rick Steves, a well known travel guide and author, the basis of the article was that having knowledge of the history of a place greatly enhances and expands the visitation experience. He relates his experience at the restored Reichstag building in Berlin. A casual visitor may see and marvel at the beautifully restored architecture without realizing that this building was used by Hitler in his rise to power.

Let's imagine ourselves at Ripley Junction, the Little Blue Battlefield, standing on the west bank of the river looking east down the old Independence-Lexington road. What do you "see"?

A developer may see a shopping area. A homeowner new homes for purchase. An environmentalist may see a large green space to be preserved. An athlete may see playing fields. All of these visions are legitimate.

My study and understanding of this area's history effects what I "see". I don't just see an open field. I envision a cold October day with men and horses racing across the landscape. I hear the boom of cannon, the rattle of small arms fire and the sounds humans make under such conditions. Some may say that this is the result of an over active imagination. Maybe so. Because I have knowledge of what took place here I can "see" these things.

We as a group must make sure that others "see" more that just what is in front of them. A place is not just now. It is made up of all things that preceded it. My challenge to you is not just to "see" what is in front of you but, to "see" what took place there. The experience of your visit will be enhanced ten fold.

## The Tsar and the President

In commemoration of the 2009 bicentennial of Abraham Lincoln's birth, an exhibit on Alexander II and Abraham Lincoln will be held at Union Station opening November 1, 2008. It explores the friendship forged between two revolutionary leaders who made groundbreaking decisions that changed their nations' futures. They came from radically different backgrounds but shared a radical vision for equality. Featured items include presidential speeches, opulent Imperial Russian artifacts, personal correspondence, and items from the Civil War.

In 1861 Alexander II freed Russia's 22 million peasants from serfdom; then, two years later, Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation. The exhibit looks at connections and parallels between Lincoln and Alexander, as well as the history of their paths to power and their tragic assassinations. There are more than 200 paintings, portraits, costumes, decorative art objects and items from Russian state museums and the U. S. Library of Congress. The exhibit will be in the KCP&L Gallery, and tickets are \$9.50 or \$6 for groups of 15 or more. # **Jackson County Cemeteries**

"Jackson County Cemeteries Are Rich in History and Lore" was the headline for Sheila Davis's article in the October 11-12 issue of *The Examiner*. With help from John Mark Lambertson, Director of the National Frontier Trails Center, she did a countdown of the Top 10 Jackson County cemeteries, and the Lewis-Gregg Cemetery was included! Number 10 was actually several cemeteries which contain Revolutionary War soldier graves such as Jeremiah Burnett at the Blue Springs Cemetery, Ledstone Noland at the Pitcher Cemetery, and Nathaniel Lewis at the Lewis-Gregg

Cemetery. Number 9 was the Sibley Cemetery which includes soldiers assigned to Fort Osage and many Native Americans. Number 8 was Mound Grove Cemetery on North River in Independence where Joseph Smith III and other leaders of the Community of Christ Church are buried. Number 7 was Lobb Cemetery off Highway 7 in Blue Springs because of early burials dating from 1836 of immigrants coming along the nearby trail. Number 6 was Union Cemetery created in 1857 for more burials between Westport and Kansas City including famous painter George Caleb Bingham and John Calvin McCoy, the founder of Westport. Number 5 is Forest Hill Cemetery at 69<sup>th</sup> and Troost for its Civil War burials and more recently for baseball greats Satchel Paige and Buck O'Neil. Number 4 is the Lee's Summit Historical Cemetery at 3<sup>rd</sup> Street and Highway 291 where various members of Quantrill's Raiders are buried as well as Cole, Jim, and Bob Younger of the James-Younger Gang. Number 3 is Woodlawn Cemetery at 701 S. Noland Road in Independence which is one of the oldest continuously used cemeteries in the county and has burials ranging from Hiram Young, an early African-American wagon maker, to Bess Wallace Truman's parents. Number 2 is Elmwood Cemetery at 4900 Truman Road which is noted for its many striking monuments to prominent Kansas Citians such as the Armour family of meatpacking fame and more than 50 ancestors of President Harry Truman. And finally, Number 1 is Mount Washington Cemetery in Independence which is noted for its impressive mausoleums, towering markers and famous folks such as Kansas City Star founder, William Rockhill Nelson and frontiersman Jim Bridger.

Don Moorehead took advantage of the exhibit at the Blue Springs Historical Society in the Dillingham-Lewis House Museum at 101 S. 15<sup>th</sup> Street to learn about lesser known cemeteries in Jackson County, especially family cemeteries located off the beaten track. His goal is to visit each of the cemeteries in their exhibit and to write directions for reaching them. He has already visited the Hudspeth Cemetery off Six Mile Church Road. The exhibit continues through November 16<sup>th</sup> on Sunday afternoons from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m.

Dennis Myers also recently assisted David Jackson of the Jackson County Historical Society in re-

locating the Robinson-Moore Cemetery north of Oak Grove, MO and found only one remaining stone. While in the area, he also made stops at the Mecklin Cemetery and the Oakwood Cemetery.

**Wayne City Landing Rededicated** 

Hugh Welsh writes in *The Examiner* of October 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup>, 2008, "Sugar Creek Bluff Rededicated for Trails Significance." On October 24, 2008, the historic Wayne City Landing was rededicated as the only place in the U.S. that four National Historic Trails overlap – the Lewis and Clark, the Santa Fe, the Oregon, and the California. It now has five exhibits, improved landscaping, fencing, benches, and sidewalks to help interpret this vital steamboat landing also called the Upper Independence Landing. It was named in honor of Lt. Anthony Wayne who camped there in 1825 with military personnel assigned to keep the Kaw Indians from advancing east. The Wayne City Landing made modern-day North River Boulevard in Sugar Creek a kind of superhighway to Independence. For three years a mule train carried goods up its steep path. But it was not to continue as the premier landing because the Great Flood of 1844 diminished much of the sandbar at the landing, and over time a shift in the river's course made it defunct by 1856. Westport Landing at the foot of Main Street in Kansas City then became the landing of choice. And thus Kansas City – not Independence – would emerge as the victor in the battle for commercial relevance.

# **Art in Unexpected Places**

The October 12, 2008 issue of the *Star Magazine* highlighted unusual locations for artwork in the Kansas City area. One is Tom Lea's mural in the post office in Pleasant Hill, MO called *Back Home*, *April 1865*. It depicts three generations of people returning to their burned home after Order No. 11 with only the chimney still standing. Tom Lea remembers painting the piece while listening to news on the radio about Adolph Hitler and about going to Pleasant Hill in 1939 to present the painting. He says that nearly every week someone requests information and a photograph of the mural.

The art of the mural is not dead as evidenced by a press release of October 20, 2008, to say that the third mural focusing on Cass County Civil War

history was installed on the east side of the Edward D. Jones building on the north side of the Harrisonville Square.

The mural features two battles, the Battle of the Ravines near Pleasant Hill on the left side, and the Burning of Dayton on the right side. The second Cass County Courthouse which stood in the center of the Square occupies the center of the mural. To its left is the R. A. Brown House which still stands. To the right is a reference to Order No. 11.

Funding for the mural was provided by donations from Peculiar Charitable Foundation, Embarq, and the Cass County Civil War Roundtable. Local artist Dan Brewer has painted all three murals and two more are planned. The first mural erected in February depicts the Jayhawkers' raid on the Harrisonville Square in July, 1861, and the second erected last April depicts the eviction and burning of the Younger home due to Order No. 11 in September, 1863.

# **A Proper Remembrance**

In his commentary in the Kansas City *Star* on October 18, 2008, columnist George Will, praises private efforts in cooperation with the National Park Service to erect a fitting Museum and Visitor Center for the Gettysburg battlefield to replace the decrepit facilities for explaining the battle and displaying its artifacts. No doubt Mike Calvert has seen the before and after view of Gettysburg and can explain it to us at the December 6<sup>th</sup> luncheon. Will goes on to say that modern day viewers can hardly fathom how the Gettysburg Cyclorama dazzled views when it was displayed in 1884. Now it has been magnificently restored and it is still stunning. He says that this public facility will help a normally amnesiac nation to long remember.

Another way to pay tribute to our history is to write about it. The Center for the Study of the Korean War located in Independence, Missouri, on the campus of Graceland University is calling for papers not just about the Korean War but all aspects of military history. The theme of its 10<sup>th</sup> annual conference is *War and Peace*. It will be looking at efforts to both end and prevent wars and to that end is soliciting papers on the role of chaplains and medical aid services. The conference will be held February 26-28, 2009, and the presentations at the
