More Civil War Reading

Joplin author Larry Wood will be signing copies of his new book, *Other Noted Guerrillas of the Civil War in Missouri*, at Half Price Books of the Ozarks in Springfield on Saturday, March 10th from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. While most books written about the guerrilla conflict in Missouri concentrate mainly on William Clarke Quantrill and his associates, this new book chronicles the lives of several lesserknown partisan leaders throughout the state, such as Jasper County's Tom Livingston and Vernon County's William Marchbanks. If you can't make it to Springfield, you may order the book from Harold Dellinger at <u>www.haroldsbookstore.com</u> or by calling him at (816) 241-2482. Retail cost is \$20. Harold also recommends *Captain Tough, Chief of Scouts* by Charles F. Harris. Mr. Harris speaks of William Sloan Tough as being "Tough in name – tough in deed."

He was one of Charles Jennison's Kansas Redlegs early in the War and soon became chief scout for U.S. Major General James Blunt. Retail cost is \$15.

Always worth a second reading are Donald Hale's books called *Missouri Civil War Miscellany*. Vol. 1 has an emphasis on the Morgan Walker incident, battles and rosters, including Warren Welch's and Frank James' lists of men who rode with Quantrill, and a register of graves at the Confederate Home at Higginsville, MO. Retail cost is \$25.

Virginia Slavery Apology Passes

In February 2007 the Virginia General Assembly voted unanimously to express "profound regret" for the state's role in slavery. Missouri lawmakers are also considering such a measure which does not carry the weight of law but sends an important symbolic message. One delegate to the Virginia House said that he thought in 20 years this act would be remembered for having passed unanimously on the grounds of the former Confederate capitol.

Hulston Mill Civil War Days

As we "spring forward" on March 11^{th} for Daylight Savings Time; can Civil War encampments and living history events be far behind? Hulston Mill Civil War Days are scheduled for June $9^{th} - 10^{th}$ at Defiance, MO, the homestead of Nathan Boone, the youngest son of Daniel Boone, where Daniel and his wife lived out their last days. There will be Hulston Mill tours and lifestyles of Indians, frontier farming, children, and slaves, as well as a Civil War surgeon, museum, period music, and sutlers.

Sharon's Swedish Cousin

Thank you to Sharon and Art Kelley for sharing Sharon's Swedish cousin, Ulla-Marta and her son Daniel, with us at a gathering Saturday evening, February 24th. Sharon and Ulla have corresponded by E-mail for three years before finally meeting in person. Come to find out, Claudetta McCorkendale also has Swedish ancestry and brought her notebook of pictures and information to share. Well-known Harry Truman interpreter Niel Johnson of Independence also attended and shared stories of trips he and his wife took to Sweden. Ulla said that Harlan Klukow (who is of German and Danish ancestry) looks a lot like a Danish jazz fiddle player, Svend Asmussen, who is popular in Sweden.

Danger to History Tourism

The Missouri Department of Natural Resources has on file applications for two concentrated animal feeding operations – one near Athens Historic Site and the other at Arrow Rock State Park. People come to these areas for history – not to smell massive amounts of hog and chicken manure. Arrow Rock has become a travel destination for history buffs and has two beautifully restored antebellum homes still privately owned. Athens Historic Site is in the northeastern corner of Missouri in Clark County and memorializes the turmoil of the Civil War era. It is perched along the banks of the Des Moines River not far from the Mississippi River. To quote Ken Midkiff, chairman of the Missouri Chapter of the Sierra Club, "Agribusiness chief executives are fond of saying: 'That stink smells like money to me.' Tourism is big business in Missouri, and manure doesn't smell like money to folks dependent upon state parks and historic sites. It just stinks."

Jim Noel Unveils Historic Hearne St. Sign

Member Karen Coin passed along a clipping from the Lee's Summit Journal dated January 24, 2007, written by Kathy Smith. Our friend Jim Noel, who gave us the tour of the Noel Ranch near Lone Jack, is a nephew of William T. Hearne who owned a large farm on what is now Chipman Road and Douglas Street in Lee's Summit. In 1888 when the City of Lee's Summit needed a connecting road to Kansas City, Mr. Hearne donated land and built the road to boot. In honor of his gift called "Kansas City Boulevard," there is now a sign at Douglas and Ash which reads "Historic Hearne Street" which Jim unveiled. Present were Bill and Lisa Edwards, owners of the Noel-Hearne home in Independence; Don Hale, President of the Lee's Summit Historical Society and a Round Table member: Brian and Sharon Snyder, owners of the McCoy House in Independence and Round Table members; and Julie Cawby, Chairperson of the Lee's Summit Historic Preservation Commission. Julie is the daughter-inlaw of Richard and Linda Cawby, longtime members of the Round Table. Julie is an architect who works on historic preservation projects and recently returned from Defiance, MO, the location of the Boone Homestead.

Symphony Designers' Showhouse

Some of our members can't get enough of old houses so they volunteer to be docents at the annual Symphony Designers' Showhouse on a Thursday evening when it's open until 8:00 p.m. Beverly Shaw researches the history of the showhouse each year as a volunteer for the Junior Women's Symphony Alliance which has been doing this project for 38 years. This may be the oldest continuously operating showhouse endeavor in the United States. The house this year is located at 829 W. 55th Street, Kansas City, MO and is an English residential design built in 1916 – 1917 by J. C. Nichols from architectural drawings by John Van Brunt. The date is May 3rd from 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m., and what we do is help visitors enjoy their tour of a beautifully decorated home which is a benefit for children's concerts performed by the Kansas City Symphony. Docents are allowed time to view the entire house at no cost and are usually lucky enough to enjoy live music and refreshments in the big tent sometime during the evening. USS Monitor Museum to Open

If you are traveling east anytime soon, you might want to visit the new *USS Monitor* Center at Newport News, VA. It's a \$30 million state-of-theart museum displaying the gun turret and many recovered artifacts from the vessel. The opening on March 9th is scheduled on the 145th anniversary of the classic battle of ironclads, the *CSS Virginia* and the *USS Monitor*, at Hampton Roads on March 9, 1862.

Good News from Civil War Preservation Trust

The Border Bugle of the Civil War Round Table of Kansas City reports that the Civil War Preservation Trust rescued 1,300 acres of hallowed ground in 2006. At the top of their list of accomplishments is the defeat of a proposed casino near Gettysburg. Of special interest to us is that 6.5 acres were protected at Mine Creek in Kansas and 70 acres at Wilson's Creek in Missouri.

With 70,000 members, the CWPT is the largest nonprofit battlefield preservation organization in the

United States. Its mission is to preserve our country's remaining Civil War battlefields. Their website is <u>www.civilwar.org</u>.

National Frontier Trails Museum Research Opportunity

On Saturday, March 10th, there will be a free open house for the Merrill Mattes Research Library at the National Frontier Trails Museum, 318 W. Pacific, Independence, MO, from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 Noon. This is for older students and adults who want to access published and unpublished diaries, journals, letters, maps, and original artifacts related to westward expansion between 1800 and 1875.

Visitors who want to see the film "West" or visit the exhibits and galleries will have to pay the usual museum admission of \$5 for adults, \$4.95 for seniors, and \$3 for children ages 6 - 17.


President's NPS Budget Proposes Record Increases for Park Operations and Centennial Initiative

Vicki Nave points out, just in case someone has not see it yet, that the President's proposed budget for 2008 includes a \$230 million increase, including \$1.5 million for ABPP grants (American Battlefield Protection Program) and \$22.5 million for land acquisition, including Civil War battlefields. *Save America's Treasures* and *Preserve America* are also in there.
