The bombardment of Fort Sumter on April 12, 1861 was the opening engagement of the American Civil War. The countdown to the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary on April 12, 2011 is just 1462 days away, as of the date of our next Round Table meeting on Wednesday, April 11, 2007.

How often have we heard people start out a joke by saying "Well, I have good news and bad news"?

Why should I stop now? Well, I have good news and bad news. I received a phone call from a friend of the Round Table last week. Connie Langum from the National Park Service at Wilson's Creek Battlefield called me and asked if I had heard the good news. I was in the dark. But I am announcing today that the Little Blue Battlefield had been named by the Civil War Preservation Trust as an "at risk" battlefield. The good news is that a national organization has recognized what we have known all along. The bad news is that the battlefield needs to be on the list.

This is a big deal. Historians always say that there were 10,000 battles during the Civil War and now The Little Blue is recognized in the top 25. Think of this the Little Blue is now being mentioned in the same circles as Cedar Creek VA, Fort Morgan AL, Gettysburg PA, Harpers Ferry WV, Iuka MS, Marietta GA, New Orleans LA, Petersburg VA and Spring Hill TN. We're in some pretty tall cotton here. This allows us to point out that our group isn't the only group that knows that we are getting ever closer to losing history that cannot be restored. We can use this listing. We need this listing. We need this listing to be able to put it in front of any organization or person that does not realize, understand or care that this battlefield is endangered and now is the time to do something.

Tim Cox tried so hard for so long to get anyone to realize the precarious position the Little Blue Battlefield is in. Now we have that recognition on a national level. We have now been given the opportunity and the tools to do great things. Let's make sure we do and let's begin at our next Round Table meeting.

# Visit To The "Dogtrot Cabin"

On Saturday, March 24<sup>th</sup>, about 16 members and friends visited the old log structure sheltered by a barn on property owned by Mr. Alan Hill on East Blue Mills Road. Mr. Curtis Walker unlocked the gate and let us climb the hill to the barn and view one of the most picturesque vistas in all of eastern Jackson County. The log structure is composed of two rooms unequal in size with a breezeway between them (thus the name "dogtrot"). Because there are no fireplaces or windows, we suspect that this was always used for agricultural purposes rather than habitation; nevertheless it is very interesting, and Annette Curtis is doing historical research to uncover more of its story. We want to thank Mr. Hill and Mr. Walker for letting us see this early structure.

This structure was likely in place during the Battle of the Little Blue and no matter what it was used for, possibly miniballs flew past during that battle. And, over the years, how many lives have walked through this doorway? How many men and women worked the soil all around it? How many children climbed the massive wooden beams to play? If you look closely and listen quietly, I think you can still see them working and playing and, perhaps, even hear their laughter.
