The bombardment of Fort Sumter on April 12, 1861 was the opening engagement of the American Civil War. The countdown to the 150th Anniversary on April 12, 2011 is just 1308 days away, as of the date of our next Round Table meeting on Wednesday, September 12, 2007.

I have written several times in the last year about my travels to battlefields in the eastern theater of the Civil War. I have extolled the merits of walking in the paths of the men who fought at these sights. I have sought to convey the emotions I have felt on these visits. I have tried to explain why it is important to our understanding of this war that we experience these historic spots. I truly believe all that I have set forth in this monthly newsletter. This month's newsletter article will be no different. However, this time I want to write about a tour that has not yet happened. I am talking about the tour that our group has planned next month for the Battle of Carthage.

If you have never had the opportunity to tour and spend time on a battlefield, part of your study of the Civil War is missing. We read about battles in books and magazines to obtain knowledge of the events but, it requires actually standing on the site to truly understand the events that took place. To truly comprehend why a commanding officer deployed his forces in a certain manner you have to look at the terrain that he looked at. To imagine in your mind what a soldier was looking at and was feeling as he gazed across a field of battle at the opposing line you have to be where he stood.

Those are just a few reasons we as Civil War buffs travel to and tour battlefields. That is why the Civil War Roundtable of Western Mo is sponsoring a tour of the Battle of Carthage on September the 15th. I urge you, if you haven't already made the commitment to join us and experience what it means to walk in the footsteps of history.

Once you have toured a battlefield you will want to do it again. Keep your calendar open we are going to fight the Battle of the Little Blue through to the Battle of Westport on October 20th. See you on the bus.

Is It In The Genes?

Independence resident Dennis Myers recently contacted distant cousins through a shared interest in Civil War history. Dennis is the editor of *The* Border Star, the monthly newsletter of the Civil War Round Table of Western Missouri. Recently he received an e-mail saying that a new member of the Round Table, Jacque Kendrick-Janney Stroud of Topeka, KS, congratulated the group on their decision to tour the Battle of Carthage on September 15, 2007. It happens that Jacque was born in the 1849 Kendrick Place which is just north of Carthage and is one of the few remaining buildings from the Civil War era. During the July 5, 1861 Battle of Carthage, Union leader Franz Siegel who commanded 1,000 German-American troops from St. Louis, used the house as his headquarters. Later in 1863 Confederate general Jo

Shelby, who was a friend of the Kendrick family, also used their home.

Dennis was immediately intrigued to read that Jacque's father was A. J. "Jack" Janney. Dennis also has Janney ancestors who can be traced to the 1500's. After communication with Jacque and her cousin, it was established that they are indeed distant cousins. If not for their shared interest in Civil War history, they might never have met.

The Civil War West of the Mississippi

The Civil War was a defining event in the history of the United States. The issues, the conflict, the brutality, and the personalities of it continue to fascinate us to this day. The public is invited to join the Civil War Round Table of the Ozarks as they examine "The Civil War West of the Mississippi" in a two day seminar on Friday evening, November 16th and all day Saturday, November 17th. The location of this seminar is the Clarion Hotel at 3333 S. Glenstone in Springfield, Missouri which will offer discounted room rates for those attending.

The seminar will feature many noted speakers. The main speakers will be M. Jane Johansson, author of *Peculiar Honor: The 28th Texas Cavalry*; William L. Share the Wealth (of Information)

David Jackson, archivist of the Jackson County Historical Archives, has partnered with the Veterans History Project to create a database of war related monuments and memorials in the Kansas City area in preparation for the new documentary on World War II created by Ken Burns which will have its first installment on September 23rd at 7:00 p.m. on KCPT, Channel 19. David gives the Civil War Round Table of Western Missouri credit for many of the Civil War entries as a result of our "Monuments" book published in 2001 as a KC150 project. However there are others that we don't have in our book, and we may want to think about adding them because we are almost out of our present supply. An added bonus this year will be the opportunity to see some of the riders from the horse race retracing the Santa Fe Trail. The 800-mile race will begin on September 3rd in Santa Fe, NM and will consist of a series of ten 50 to 55-mile events until the riders arrive in Gardner, KS on September 14th. Because of the different municipalities involved, the racers will not end in Independence, but a celebration involving some of the racers will be held here on September 15th. They are expected to arrive at the

Frontier Trails Museum across from the Bingham-Waggoner Estate about 4:00 p.m. and ride to the Independence Square at 4:45 p.m. to deliver a real bag of mail to Mayor Don Reimal and Postmaster Mark McDonald. They will then return to the Bingham-Waggoner Estate for the Pig Pickin'-Chicken Lickin' event.

The Santa Fe Trail originally began in Franklin, MO, but Independence became its eastern terminus in 1827. Mainly used for commerce, millions of dollars of goods traveled along the trail to Santa Fe, which at the time was a major Mexican city.

50th Annual Missouri Conference on History

The 50th annual meeting sponsored by The State Historical Society of Missouri will take place April 3 - 4, 2008 at the Courtyard Marriott in Columbia, Missouri. Richard Kirkendall, who served as the keynote speaker at the first Missouri Conference, will be speaking on "Faith and Foreign Policy: An Exploration into the Mind of Harry Truman." He is now professor emeritus at the University of Washington, but he previously taught at Wesleyan University, the University of Missouri-Columbia, Indiana University, and Iowa State University.

Proposals for conference sessions and papers related to any and all historical topics or eras are welcome. The conference is particularly interested in proposals for complete sessions, including panelists, chair, and commentator. Civil War Sesquicentennial Act

Southwest Missouri Congressman Roy Blunt responded to Len Eagleburger's query about the disposition of a Civil War Sesquicentennial Act. The first effort to establish a commission to plan, develop, and carry out programs and activities appropriate to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the Civil War failed because the 109th Congress adjourned without voting on the legislation.

Congressman Baker reintroduced the Act in H. R. 1131 on February 16, 2007. It is currently under consideration in the House Committee on Government and Reform. This measure would allow the National Endowment for the Humanities to award grants for appropriate activities and programs.

Willing to Serve

Civil War Themes in the Arts

It seems as we get closer to the 2011 anniversary of the beginning of the Civil War, there are more books, movies, plays, and operas based on Civil War themes. Yes, even operas!

The Lyric Opera in Kansas City, Missouri will be presenting the world premiere of Kirke Mechem's *John Brown* in May, 2008. Civil War historians throughout the nation are all aflutter about whether the production will depict the abolitionist as a saint or a madman. In the August 22, 2007 issue of the Kansas City *Star*, Vern Barnet in his "Faith and Beliefs" column asks the questions, "Is violence ever justified? Does beneficial social and political progress ever originate from murder? Do religious and moral convictions transform a terrorist into a martyr?" Does this sound familiar in 2007?

Speaking of murder, the newest Jesse James movie should be hitting the theatres soon. It stars Springfield native Brad Pitt as Jesse James near the end of his life and Casey Affleck as Bob Ford in the production called "The Assassination of Jesse James by the Coward Robert Ford." Unfortunately St. Joseph, Missouri, where the deed was done, was not used in the filming and will not have a premiere showing. However they continue to use the theme "Where the Pony Express Began and Jesse James Ended." The James home was moved in 1977 to the grounds of the Patee House Museum at 12th and Penn Street in St. Joseph which is about two blocks from its original site. Deb and Tom Goodrich are offering a tour on September 22^{nd} to visit the actual scenes depicted in the film and also sites made famous by Bill Cody, the legendary Pony Express rider and showman. The tour starts from Topeka, KS at 8:30 a.m. and costs \$75 per person or \$140 per couple. It includes lunch, snacks, and admission plus the services of two very knowledgeable guides. Harold Dellinger's talk at the downtown Kansas City, Missouri Library was well received on August 30th. He spoke about researching the book he just edited on the life of Jesse James. He said there are over 1,000 books written with Jesse as the main subject, and he read close to 400 to prepare his "best of." Mike Calvert and Bob Boland from the Round Table were both in attendance in addition to 120-140 other people, and book sales were brisk. Speaking of authors, Deryl Sellmeyer has been on a speaking tour on behalf of his new book *Jo Shelby's Iron Brigade*. It came out just in time for the 150th anniversary of Jo Shelby's wedding at the Waverly, Missouri Heritage Days. He spoke to the Civil War Study Group in Independence in August, and the book is available for \$29.95 at the Blue and Grey Book Shoppe, 106 E. Walnut, Independence, MO for those south of the River and at James Country Mercantile at 111 N. Main St., Liberty, MO for Northlanders. The book depicts the Confederate Iron Brigade as the toughest, most accomplished cavalry brigade west of the Mississippi.

Finally, a play called "Broken Strings" written by Bill Rogers of Blue Springs is a portrayal of life during the Border Wars. Two friends who share a violent history go their separate ways. One gets married and becomes a farmer. The other finds himself an outlaw. What happens when they meet again on the Kansas-Missouri border after the Civil War? The production was staged at the Just Off Broadway Theatre in Kansas City, MO.



"They fought us on the blue grass ridges¹"

On October 21-22, 1864, some 15,000 Union and Confederate forces fought along the banks of the Little Blue River in eastern Independence. It's estimated there were about 500 Union casualties and 500 Confederate casualties on this "hollowed ground." It was hoped by the Confederacy that this push by General Price into Missouri would take pressure off the Eastern Front. However, by virtue of its failure, Prices' raid assisted in bringing closure to the Civil War by 1865. This two-day battle slowed the advances of the Confederates and served as a prelude to the Second Battle of Independence, Bryam's Ford (The Big Blue River) and the Battle of Westport (the largest Civil War battle west of the Mississippi River). Lest we forget, "we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain.²,²

Civil War Battlefield Tours Saturday, October 20, 2007

The Civil War Round Table of Western Missouri invites you to join them for a guided bus tour of the Battle of the Little Blue from 9:00 a.m. to Noon for a cost of just \$15.00 which includes coach transportation, a knowledgeable guide and a tour booklet.

The coach will leave the Old Blake Museum (Blue & Grey Book Shoppe). 106 E. Walnut, Independence, MO at 9:00 a.m. Parking is available on the street near the intersection of Main and Walnut. Please do not use any business parking lots.

The Battle of the Little Blue is also known as Day 1 of the Battle of Westport, October 1864. It took place near 24 Highway at the Little Blue River in eastern Jackson County. We will be dismounting at the Ripley Junction, Jackson County Park which is a part of the biking and hiking trail paralleling the Little Blue River. This is the engagement of the Confederate forces under the leadership of General Sterling Price in his last raid on Union territory in Missouri.

If you would like to know what happened after the Battle of the Little Blue, please turn the page for information about the afternoon tour.

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Civil War Battlefield Afternoon Tour The afternoon of October 20th you will have the opportunity to follow the approximate route of the troops falling back to Kansas City after the Battle of the Little Blue. At 1:00 p.m. a guided coach tour will leave the Old Blake Museum at 106 E. Walnut, Independence, MO. It will take you to the Battle of the Big Blue at Byram's Ford near 63rd Street and Manchester. From there you will travel to Forest Hill Cemetery, and the Loose Park area where the Battle of Westport was most fierce. Along the way we will point out markers erected by the Monnett Battle of Westport Fund which can be used for self-guided car tours. We will journey north to the Harris-Kearney House and then travel down Westport Road where the Union officers observed the battle from the roof of the Harris House Hotel. The coach will return to the Old Blake Museum by 5:00 p.m.

As an added attraction, we will spend about an hour touring a special exhibit of the Battle of Westport at the Harris-Kearney House, 4000 Baltimore, Kansas City, Missouri.

The cost of the afternoon tour is \$15.00 which includes coach transportation, a knowledgeable guide and a special program book printed for the reenactment of the Battle of Westport on its 125th anniversary.

Taking both morning and afternoon tours for a cost of \$30.00 also gives you a membership in the Civil War Round Table of Western Missouri for the remainder of 2007. There will be a break of one hour between tours for lunch on your own or brown bag. For more information please call (816) 478-7648.

Independence Tour and Monuments A self-guided tour of six Civil War markers will take you back to the two-day battle of Independence in October of 1864.

<u>Stop A</u> - North side of westbound U.S. 24 Highway, just east of the Little Blue River.

<u>Stop B</u> - Jackson County park off Old Lexington Road at the Little Blue River in the village of Ripley, Missouri. This marker includes a battlefield map of the region to help explain how the battle took place here and how the troops moved in the course of the battle.

<u>Stop C</u> - Union troop line at 11:00 a.m. on October 21, 1864. The marker is located at the northeast corner of U.S. 24 Highway and Blue Mills Road, just west of New Salem Church.

<u>Stop D</u> - Titled the Second Battle of Independence in October of 1864, this marker is located at the northwest corner of Main Street and Truman Road, near the Old Jail Museum and Truman Visitors Center.

<u>Stop E</u> - Located on the southeast corner of River Blvd. and Kansas Street in front of the Community of Christ Temple.

<u>Stop F</u> - This is the battle line at the railroad cut, located at the corner of Lexington and Crysler streets.

Other Independence markers include three in Woodland Cemetery, 701 S. Noland Road, which are the *Soldiers of the Confederacy Memorial*, the 2nd *Colorado Cavalry Memorial* and the 9 Unknown Confederates Marker. Other markers include the 1st Battle of Independence Marker at the southwest corner of the brick patio surrounding the Jackson County Courthouse on the Lexington Street side and the plaque on the building in the 200 block of W.
