Report on the Christmas Party

About 40 people enjoyed the deli tray and drinks provided by the Round Table as well as dishes everyone brought to share. As usual Karen Wells provided her delicious "slush" to get us in a party mood.

Randall Todd was able to stop by for a quick lunch before continuing his appointed rounds for Federal Express. He brought us greetings from Dr. Gerald Anderson, our Director Emeritus, who helped found our group. Dr. Anderson resides at the Missouri Veterans Home in Cameron, MO. We signed a Christmas card to send to Dr. Anderson.

The surprise program was given by Dwight Frizzell, Assistant Professor of Photography and New Media at the Kansas City Art Institute, who actually grew up in Independence. He brought his wife Rhonda and his mother who still resides in Independence. Dwight researched an aspect of Missouri Civil War history that is little known about an enclave of Irish immigrants who settled in an area near West Plains, Missouri, above the Eleven Point River. **Christmas Party Report (continued...)** In addition to the paper trail which he collected in a notebook and shared with us, he created a radio program called "The Irish Wilderness" which includes narrative from a Catholic Priest who later came to Kansas City as well as ambient sounds from the caves and dripping water in the area. Dwight brought four CD copies of the radio broadcast to give away and also had musical recordings for sale by the group called BCR (Black Crack Review), a jazz ensemble in which he plays saxophones. There has been a lot of publicity on National Public Radio and in print about a new book called *The Confederate Battle Flag: America's Most Embattled Emblem* by John Coski, Director of the Library and Historian at the Museum of the Confederacy in Richmond, VA. He seems to have a balanced and reasoned viewpoint of the flag controversy. There are some copies in the Mid-Continent Library system. The Kansas City Round Table is sponsoring a talk by Mr. Coski at their Dinner Meeting on March 28, 2006. There will also be copies of his book for purchase and signing.

Doris Kearns Goodwin has written a new book in which some may see her as having redeemed her reputation as a historical scholar. The book, *Team of Rivals: The Political Genius of Abraham Lincoln*, begins in May 1860 when Lincoln bests such formidable rivals as New York's William H. Seward, Ohio's Salmon P. Chase and Missouri's Edward Bates. Lincoln stunned them all by winning - and then he stunned them by putting them in his Cabinet.

Pre-decorated Symphony Designers' Showhouse

The Symphony Designers' Showhouse for 2006 is the Richard and Annette Bloch home, 6315 Ward Parkway (east side of street between 63rd and Greenway Terr.). It usually has bright blue awnings in the spring and summer. Mr. Bloch passed away last year and his wife is moving to the Plaza so the house is on the market. Some of you might like to see the house before it's decorated. The weekend for the pre-decorated tour is January 28-29, 2006. The hours on Saturday are 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and on Sunday, Noon to 5:00 p.m. Cost is \$5.00.

The house is English Georgian style designed by Edward Tanner who did many of the J. C. Nichols houses. This was built on speculation and was started in 1925 and completed in 1926. The first owner was Mr. Dan Moser who, at various times, was a cigar store owner like his father and later sold refrigerators. He had the first swimming pool in Kansas City installed in 1927, and Hare & Hare designed the grounds for the home which takes up four city blocks. He died at the house in 1940.

The second family was Samuel Greenberg and his wife Gertrude. They owned The Leader Clothing Company, 632 Minnesota Ave., Kansas City, KS.

The third family was Hyman and Rosalind Davidson of the Davidson Furniture Company in the 1950's. The Bloch family bought the house in 1957 and have lived there since.
