## Public Preview of Symphony Designers' Showhouse

One of the spring activities of the Civil War Round Table of Western Missouri has been to volunteer to be docents at the annual Symphony Designers' Showhouse on a designated Thursday evening from about 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. The sponsoring auxiliary of the Symphony obtains the use of a large house for about six months and invites area interior designers to decorate a room or a design area (including outdoor gardens and porches). The public is then invited to see the results which resemble something out of House Beautiful magazine. The ticket prices, boutique, lunch room, private parties, and school tours usually raise about \$100,000 a year for the Kansas City Symphony.

The house for 2005 is located at 5300 Belleview, Kansas City, Missouri. It will be the 36th year of this project, and in fact this particular house was a Showhouse 25 years ago. It has had extensive remodeling two years ago and is in wonderful shape for a 1914 house and carriage house.

If you would like to see "The Before," you can do so the weekend of January 29-30, 2005, for a fee of \$5.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children under 12. On Saturday the hours are 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and on Sunday the hours are Noon to 4:00 p.m. One interesting thing about the house is that it has been used as the residence of the Japanese Consul General for the Midwest Region. The consulate in Kansas City is closing at the end of 2004, and Mr. Shibata will be returning to the UN in New York. The present owner is graciously allowing the Junior Women's Symphony Alliance to present the house as the 2005 Symphony Designers' Showhouse. Advance tickets are not necessary; you just pay at the door. Call Beverly Shaw at (816) 478-7648 if you need directions. It is near Loose Park and Ward Parkway in Kansas City. Remember, if you volunteer to help us after it's decorated, you get to see the end result for free instead of paying \$12 at the door or \$10 for advance tickets.

For those who just want to receive the newsletter, we have a subscription rate of \$9.00 for the year.

▶ In December, 2004, we received a generous \$3,000 donation in honor of Sonny Wells from his mother, Jane Wells of Lincoln, Nebraska. The Board decided to establish a separate savings account to hold the funds that are earmarked for the Little Blue Battlefield preservation in memory of Sonny, our founder and past president. The new account is called the "Sonny Wells Little Blue Battlefield Memorial Fund" and is held at United Missouri Bank along with our checking account and regular savings account. The new account had an opening balance of \$5, 050 which included a transfer from our regular savings account.

The regular savings account balance is \$1,349.63 and the checking account balance is \$49.35. In addition to publishing our monthly newsletter, we had a one-time expense in 2004 of buying period flags and staffs for use at special events.

▶ The Treasurer and President have been hard at work on the application for 501(c)(3) status with the IRS so that future donations for battlefield preservation will be tax-deductible. We received a very generous donation form Donna Daniels to pay the filing fee.

I want to thank our members for their dues and the spirit of cooperation and friendship within the group.

## **Christmas Party in Westport**

On Saturday, December 4, 2004, about 35 members of the Civil War Round Table of Western Missouri and the Union Cemetery Historical Society held a Christmas luncheon and program at the Harris-Kearney House, 4000 Baltimore, Kansas City, Missouri. Hopefully you received a telephone call to say the location of the party was moved from the Loose Park Garden Center to the 1855 brick museum house that is the headquarters of the Westport Historical Society as the garden center was without heat.

After a bountiful potluck luncheon (complete with Karen Wells' famous "slush" and J. R. Russell's purchase of homemade tamales), we retired to the dining room to enjoy door prizes supplied by both organizations and a trivia quize prepared by Tim Cox.

Those who had never visited the Harris-Kearney House (which was used by Union troops during the Battle of Westport) were allowed to view the south parlor and two upstairs bedrooms which have been furnished by the Woman's City Club, Colonial Dames Chapter 13 and private donors. At the time of the Civil War, the house stood at Westport Road and Main Street, looking toward downtown Kansas City, Missouri. In 1878 a back wing was added by Charles Esmonde Kearney who married on of Colonel Jack Harris' daughters – thus the name "Harris-Kearney House."

In the 1920's the house was in danger of being torn down so a group of civic minded citizens raised enough money to "save the Harris House." The back wing was severed, the two parts of the house were placed on skids and moved one block to 4000 Baltimore, where it was reassembled.
