I'VE SEEN THE ELEPHANT, AND...

Thoughts from Tim Cox, President

I've seen the elephant, and therefore want to relate to you the following newsworthy items:

October Program - October 13, 2004 - Michael Grossi and The Postmen of The Civil War

Round Table member Michael Grossi captivated us all with his first person impression of a civilian postman, at the October meeting of The Round Table. Wow! Michael not only related to us his vast knowledge of postal operations during the War, but shared his visual props with us as well - from his antique postal scale, to the intricately reproduced sheets of stamps, to the

Here a few points of note from the presentation:

- * The Confederates never had "gummed" stamps, and at one time even tried using boys to apply wallpaper paste to them.
- * Soldiers sometimes paid postmasters a penny a page to read or write for them as needed.
- * You could cut a 20 cent stamp in half if you needed a 10 cent stamp.
- * If you "wrote a fair hand" during the War, you were the equivalent of today's computer geek.
- * The Military Post Office traveled with the armies, contracting with civilian mail handlers.
- * In 1864, the Confederates appointed 3 female Postmasters.
- Soldiers did not pay for postage themselves, but sent their mail "postage due."
- About 20 private companies existed, such as the "Adams Express" and "Southern Express," that sneaked mail for you through enemy lines, for a premium charge.
- * If mail was sent from the South to occupied land in the North, the items ended up in the Richmond "Dead Letter Office."

Thank you for this presentation Mike, it was fantastic. This was an adjunct performance to that given at The Reveille this June past, also featuring Mr. Grossi's knowledge of "Spencerian Script." Michael exhibited previously at The National Postal Museum, and by special invitation of the Smithsonian, traveled abroad to France to present as well.
