## In Memoriam



Harold "Sonny" Franklin Wells, Jr., age 64, of Kearney, MO, died Tuesday, March 16, 2004, at his home. Funeral services were Sunday, March 21, 2004, at the First Christian Church, Kearney, MO with Rev. Doug Gilpin officiating. Music by Jane Worley, Martha Armstrong and Diana Withford, Pianist. Casket Bearers were Tim Cox, Art Kelley, Terry McConnell, Charles McCorkendale, Robert "Lucky" Mason and Larry Daniels. Honorary Casket Bearers were Bob Werline and Richard Abbott. Burial was at the Glenridge Cemetery, Liberty, MO. Friends called on Sunday, March 21<sup>st</sup> at the church. The family suggests memorial contributions to the preservation of the Little Blue Battle Field, in eastern Jackson County, in care of the Civil War Round Table of Western Missouri, 17313 E. 51<sup>st</sup> Terrace Court, Independence, MO 64055 or the First Christian Church of Kearney.

Sonny was born September 3, 1939 in Lincoln, NE, the son of Harold F. Sr. and Jane Wilson Wells. He was married to Karen Kay Klamert in 1961 in Tilden, NE. They moved to Kansas City, KS in 1966, to Liberty in 1978, and to Kearney in 1997. Sonny was a firefighter with the Kansas City, KS Fire Department from 1972 to 1974. He owned and operated a Chicken Delight franchise in Kansas City, KS from 1966 to 1973. He had worked for the American Red Cross as Safety Director of Wyandotte County, KS from 1971 to 1976. At the time of his death, he operated the Civil War Shoppe and Wells Tours. He was the Midwest representative for the Medal of Honor Society, and a member of the Board of directors for the Congressional Medal of Honor Society. Mr. Wells was co-founder and had served for ten years as president of the Civil War Round Table of Western Missouri. He was a member of the Clay County Archives, the Clay County Museum and Historical Society and the Union Cemetery Historical Society of Kansas City. He was a member of the Westport Historical Society, American Society of Necrolithologists, the Quantrill Society, Missouri Historical Society, Confederate P.O.W. Society, and Civil War Associates. He was the Event Coordinator for several Missouri Civil War reenactments. He compiled "Civil War Monuments and Memorials of the Kansas City Area," as well as numerous other historical books. He had received numerous awards for civil and charitable work including Honorary Kentucky Colonel for his work this past year in returning remains of a Civil War veteran to his native state. He was a member of the First Christian Church of Kearney.

Sonny is survived by his wife of 42 years, Karen Wells; two sons, Kevin Wells, His fiancée', Jodi Leon, and her son, Cole of Parkville, MO, Kurt Wells and his wife, Kathy, Liberty, MO; his mother, Jane Wells, Bella Vista, AR; a sister, Joan Peterson, Lincoln, NE; two brothers, Cal Wells, Lincoln, NE and Dave Wells, Omaha, NE; grandchildren, Jennifer Griswold and Carson Wells; and great-granddaughter, Kaitlyn Griswold.

Art and I were working at a small cemetery in Independence in the early 1980's when Sonny entered our lives. It seems there was one lone confederate soldier buried there, and Sonny wanted to find the gravesite. We poured over records, disbelieving all the time, that we could have a burial from that time period. The cemetery wasn't that old but you know the results – we found the grave! Sure enough, he was a Confederate officer. For the next few years, when graves were decorated for Memorial Day, Sonny made sure that we had a Confederate flag for this one grave. You could not have contact with Sonny without becoming totally absorbed. I had been my family's historian for some twenty years when we met, and had various documents regarding the military service of my ancestors, but had never really considered what I had or where they had been. Sonny instilled an interest to trace these documents, regiments, family members and events. We took tours on buses, stood with groups in circles in cemeteries, ate hotdogs and marshmallows around campfires while Sonny and others told stories. We ate hardtack and held our ears while cannons fired, scratched mosquito bites and waded through muddy cornfields to view a gravesite. Art even got to eat a Runza! Even my fifth grade son wanted to attend reenactments and see the action while he was studying the Civil War in class. His teacher was very excited with the books and medals he brought to class to share. What impressed us most was Sonny's way. He lived life to the fullest. He was curious, investigative, inspiring and he brought all of us around him to a higher plateau to do the same. I guess I will always think of Sonny, as I pour over my family research and make sure, one more time, that what I have is proven and accurate. But more than that, I will share what I learn. After all, the history of our ancestors will only live again, if it is told and Sonny taught us that. He always gave freely, lending his expertise and expansive collection of documents without hesitation, even suggesting further locations of possible discoveries for our research. If Sonny ever had a motto, it would have been: Learn from yesterday, Live for today, Hope for tomorrow. God Bless Sonny!
