President's Letter

This month I want to continue the discussion on how we should and how we must share history.

I have a deal with my family that started some years ago and continues to this day despite the fact that my children are grown and have children of their own. As we travelled around the metropolitan area I would relate some historic fact or tell the historic story about the place we were travelling by. Stories that, of course, included the local battles. Grinter's Farm was especially one that was told quite often. Of course, the story always began with a series of groans from the audience. However, being the dad, I knew it was my duty to relate the history of my family's hometown. I would just talk louder and they would try to be louder still. Age and the fact that I was driving always won out. I know the stories were remembered. You see, we had a deal. If anyone in the car could relate what happened, then I wouldn't tell the story anymore. Eventually I wasn't giving history lessons. I don't despair. I have four grandchildren and soon they will be old enough to groan when Papa begins with "Who knows what happened here?"

Lesson: Pass on the history of your town even with a chorus of groans to help emphasize the action.

My Dad passed away several years ago and as happens when we returned from the funeral my siblings and I rummaged through a box of my dad's mementos. At the time I was taken back by what little my dad kept to remember events in his life. I really thought that it was one of the saddest things I had ever seen. An 18 inch by 18 inch by 18 inch cardboard container that held what I thought should have been important icons that marked the highlights of his life. Items that marked the history of a man who had given so much. A few years later I finally woke up to realize my dad's life was not about what was in that box. It was the five children and the many, many friends he had. My dad came from a time when a man didn't share much about their life and heaven forbid, their feelings. I learned a few things, but never very much. Sometimes history is contained in a great deed of heroism. Sometimes it's contained in the way you led your life as an example of a hard worker who loved to have his family around him and when a friend needed your help; you helped. I hope that history was passed on to me. I hope that beyond telling some stories that my history will live on in my children and my children's children. I hope it will, but I have to remember to share.

David was in a restaurant when a fellow customer fell to the floor. He and two other men performed CPR until emergency services arrived and took him to the hospital.

The award was delivered at a ceremony in the Capitol Rotunda in Jefferson City by Missouri Preservation, a group based in Boonville. As a part of Heritage Month in Independence you may tour the Courthouse on May 10th at 2:00 p.m.

The Friends of Arrow Rock have welcomed a new Executive Director. Her name is **Sandy Selby** and she and her husband Marty have lived in Arrow Rock since 2005 and have done restoration work on two historic Arrow Rock homes. She has extensive business and

journalism experience and worked most recently for *Inside Columbia*, a family of magazines. She is very familiar with the history of Arrow Rock and has authored two books: *Images of America: Arrow Rock* in 2012 and the Friends' prize-winning history of the organization, *Friends of Arrow Rock: The First 55 Years* in 2014.

Melanie and Perry Johnson are hosting a 160th anniversary of their antebellum home, the Stone-Gamble House (aka Silver Heart Inn) at 1114 S. Noland Road. The house is especially well-known at Christmas for the tree on the second floor balcony. You will see in the calendar that they begin the weekend of May 20-22 with a Civil War encampment and 1856 living history experience. They would welcome your help to take tickets or help with tours of the house on Saturday afternoon, May 21st, or dress in costume and interact with visitors. In addition to serving on our board, the Johnsons also hosted our meetings for a couple of months while we located a new place. Their house was on our Antebellum Homes Tour several years ago.

You have probably seen the news that **Harriet Tubman** will be replacing Andrew Jackson on the \$20 bill. This is a deeply symbolic move to recognize her work with the Underground Railroad. It is also a meaningful change for Native Americans who revile Jackson for forcing Cherokees and many other Indian nations on deadly marches out of their southern homelands. To this day some of the Cherokee elders will not even touch a \$20 bill. Amrita Myers, a historian at Indiana University, says, "Every time you pick up that \$20 bill (with Harriet Tubman), it's a reminder that we can't ignore or pretend like we didn't have 400 years of slavery."

The Civil War movie called "Union Bound" is now playing in the Kansas City area. It's based on a true story about the diaries of Union soldiers Sergeant Joseph E. Hoover and Tom Ryan. They escaped from a prisoner of war camp in Florence, South Carolina and with the help of a black slave, they were able to make it back to Union lines. The theatres are the B&B Shawnee at 16301 Midland Drive, Shawnee, KS (phone 913-954-4671); the B&B Overland Park 16, 8601 W. 135th, Overland Park, KS (phone 913-814-7469); and the Regal Kansas City Stadium 18 at Ameristar Casino, 3200 Ameristar Drive, Kansas City, MO (phone 844-462-7342, Ext. 252). It's best to call for show times and ticket prices because it may not be held over too long.

Phil Young is our contact with the Posse of the Westerners and is giving their program on May 10th. "100 Miles North of Dodge City" is a personal account of growing up at Reager, Kansas near the Norton County Courthouse where his grandfather, Frank Young, was called to serve on the jury of the Dewey-Berry feud. As a young boy in Kansas, Young heard about the Dewey Ranch cowhands riding into Norton wearing gun belts. In 1904 the jury returned a verdict of "not guilty" for the Dewey ranch hands. The Berry supporters were so outraged that they hung the jury in effigy on the grounds of the Courthouse. Young notes that this trial and other legal actions were significant in the history of Kansas.

Bill and Annette Curtis W.Z. Hickman Award, 2016

Bill and Annette Curtis live and breathe history. One of their greatest missions in life has been to preserve and share the history which means so much to them. Bill became fascinated with history at an exceptionally early age, listening to the "old timers" talk, interviewing some of them and recording the information he learned. His knowledge is invaluable. During their married life, Annette has joined Bill in this passion for the past.

At their own expense they have set markers of numerous historic sites as well as the graves of many historic people. They have used their own resources to buy collection items to make sure they stayed local. The couple saved from demolition one of the oldest houses in Independence. It is a pioneer brick house which was built in 1826 by African-American slave labor for Jones Flournoy. They carefully rebuilt it with the original material and then, knowing that historically it had special meaning to the Latter Day Saints, they donated the building to the Community of Christ which then placed it in its "Heritage Plaza" on Lexington Avenue.

This committed couple also saved various documents and items of historical interest from destruction through the years. They have donated original documents and photographs to archives around the country. The Jackson County Historical Society (JCHS) in the Historic Truman Jackson County Courthouse on the Independence Square is where the majority of their historical collections are assembled into the William J. "Bill" and Annette (Wegner) Curtis Collection; and they continue to add to this collection regularly...quite a legacy!

One notable organization which has benefited by Bill and Annette's undying passion is the Midwest Afro-American Genealogical Interest Coalition (MAGIC). Through MAGIC, they have donated countless hours of time and toil to help document and preserve local black history in Independence and the Kansas City metro area. Many of the books MAGIC has compiled and published have been influenced and aided by Annette's guidance and indexing skills.
