President's Letter

It has happened before history was recorded. It is still happening. It will happen tomorrow. It will happen next year. It will happen a hundred years from now. It will happen when history is no longer recorded. It is the act of soldiers leaving home for some far off war and because of their call to duty saying goodbye to their loved ones. The only parallel I can draw from my life is the many times I have had to pack my bags and leave my loved ones behind. I know it wasn't exactly the same. I know that I could reasonably be assured that I would return home. The feeling of separation was as real for me as it is for the soldier. I watch the news reports that show a unit being deployed and I watch husbands embrace wife and children with the hope that signal to leave won't come. I see the tears that start to well in red eyes, the lasting longing looks and then the utterly absolute willpower that it takes to break the unseen bond that holds them together. I sit in awe of one of the brayest acts these individuals will ever do--turn their back and leave.

Then I watch the news reports when the soldiers return. I see the unbounded joy of the first sight of the returning loved one. The rush to make that first embrace that often finds the children being crushed between mom and dad. I see the red eyes and the tears. This time for joy.

What we don't often see is the family that waits for the flag-draped coffin along with the red eyes and tears that are found there. The loss of a loved one is often impossible to comprehend. Pride can be taken in the sacrifice to the country, but it really doesn't truly make the loss easier. I wonder sometimes not only about the immediate loss to the family but also about the long term loss. The inventions not invented. The children not born. The list could go on and on. I did a small calculation. If you assume 1 million casualties in the Civil War and calculated the number of persons who do not exist today the number could be 5 million. How many ideas, inventions, cures, mothers, fathers, sisters, and brothers have we not known? Too many and it still goes on.

News About Members and Friends

Congratulations to the **Independence Pioneers Chapter** for the election of one of its own to be Regent of the Missouri State Society Daughters of the American Revolution. **Susan Fain Bowman** was installed June 19, 2016 at the 125th Continental Congress in Washington, D.C. Her state motto is "Three CHEERS for Missouri DAR in Historic Preservation, Education, and Patriotism."

Vernon and Winifred Case celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary in July 2016. Winnie is a longtime member of the Round Table and is very active with the Jackson County Genealogical Society.

The Kansas City, MO City Council recently approved \$1.2 million for enhancements to the Grand Boulevard bridge over Interstate 670 in downtown Kansas City. These will include wider sidewalks, fencing, and lighting. The bridge has to be replaced because of structural problems and is on a fast track to open by December 1, 2016. We are interested in the improvements because the **historical marker placed by the Native Sons and Daughters** to commemorate the collapse of the jail where southern women died and others were injured was moved to the north end of the bridge when the Sprint Center was built. This event was one of the provocations for the guerrilla raid on Lawrence, Kansas.

Pat Gradwohl recently visited her daughter and son-in-law in Panama City, Florida where they have a lovely condo on the Gulf. At the other border of the U. S. **Barbara and Dick Hughes** celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary with a cruise to Alaska.

John Sotos, a cardiologist and medical consultant who helped dream up the mystery diseases on the TV show "House," recently published an article which suggests that Mary Todd Lincoln's odd behavior might have been the result of a vitamin B-12 deficiency which can cause pernicious anemia. The symptoms can include some mental problems such as irritability, delusions, and hallucinations.

The **Missouri History Museum** in St. Louis, MO was recently awarded two Awards of Merit from the American Association of State and Local History – one for its History Clubhouse for children and one for "A Walk in 1875 St. Louis," which enlarged the cartographic masterpiece, *Pictorial St. Louis*, to a scale never before seen to enable visitors to walk through Gilded Age St. Louis.

Another recent honor was received by the **Monnett Battle** of Westport Fund which is responsible for the preservation of the battlefield at Byram's Ford on 63rd Street in Kansas City which was the second day of the Battle of Westport. The Westport Historical Society awarded the 2016 R. Crosby Kemper III Historic Preservation Award based on the preservation of Civil War history and the opening of the Battle of Westport Museum to educate visitors about the largest Civil War battle west of the Mississippi.

The **Pioneer Woman** statue will soon retake her place at the **National Frontier Trails Museum** in Independence, MO by the time of Santa-Cali-Gon Days over Labor Day weekend on the Square. The statue shows a woman with a baby in her arms and symbolizes the grit and sheer endurance of the women who made the trip west from Independence and the local women who have been pioneers in many spheres of the community. The original was stolen three summers ago and cut into pieces for salvage.

It is with regret that **Richard Stewart** is "retiring" from the history field where he has worked for 13 years, first as historian at Elmwood Cemetery and later as a researcher on Quantrill and the Missouri-Kansas Border Wars. He created the "Quantrill Special Collections" at the Benton County Historical Society in Bentonville, Arkansas. He would like to thank those who supported his research with contributions of money and materials.

The **University of St. Mary** in Leavenworth, KS is adding some 3,000 pieces of Civil War history to its collection with a gift from the **Bobby D. Lawrence family**. The collection has primary sources and artifacts from the Civil War era including more than 2,000 books that will go into the library's circulation to be checked out by students and members of the public. The collection will have a blessing and opening ceremony in September.

Lee Ward's collection of antique funeral artifacts is headed to the National Museum of Funeral History in Houston. Many of his oldest artifacts came from the former Reppert-Brown Funeral Home in Buckner, MO (now Speaks-Buckner Chapel) which is reportedly the oldest continuously operated funeral home west of the Mississippi River since 1868. Lee and Emily were kind enough to host the Round Table for a tour of the collection many years ago, and we appreciate the knowledge he imparted with his *book Coffins, Kits, and More*.

There is now a monument to **Cathay Williams**, a female Buffalo Soldier, who disguised herself as a man to enlist and is the only known black woman to serve in the U. S. army during the 19th century. She was born in Independence, MO as a slave and was forced to serve in the Union Army as a cook, then served two years as a man. Her gender was eventually discovered and she was dismissed from the service. She is known as a trail-blazer who set the path for all black female soldiers. The bust of Williams is located at the Richard Allen Cultural Center and Museum in Leavenworth, KS.
