President's Letter

On April 12, 1861, in Charleston, South Carolina, the Confederate batteries surrounding Ft. Sumter opened fire. This bombardment continued until the 34th hour and on April 13th, the fort surrendered. We all know the result of this action; four long years of war, a countless expenditure of money and 1 million dead.

On or about April 13, 1961 secession again became a reality. As history has recorded the following are the actions that lead up to McDonald County severing its ties with the sovereign state of Missouri. The Missouri Highway Department distributed their annual Family Vacationland Map on April 3, 1961 with one grave and fateful error. They forgot McDonald County. Now McDonald County and the city of Noel were the Silver Dollar City of the day, less rides and other attractions. It was a land of natural beauty and not a lot else, so tourist dollars were very important and being left off of the map meant a decrease in income. Immediately a petition was circulated to bring forth the complaint and this was sent to the county representative. The next week after a resolution to remove the map the matter was given to the House Committee on Miscellaneous Affairs. Two guesses as to what happened there. Mired in the governmental abyss with no action coming forth, the citizens of the county decided to secede. A president and all the offices of government were established. "Welcome to McDonald Territory" signs were erected. Passports, territorial stamps and visas were printed and 300 men were called out to form a border patrol against "the tyranny of omission" and to keep certain people out like the Missouri tax collectors.

At one point there was talk of contacting the United Nations for \$4 billion in foreign aid. Television interviews were granted with the border guard dressed in mountain man garb and antique muzzle loaders. In an ironic twist of history the United Sons of the Union and Confederacy club from Jasper County sent a message to the succession leaders: "Stop the secession or risk war." In fact, a 75 man army invaded the county and skirmish ensued with an estimated 4000 spectators on hand. Peace was restored when one of the antique muskets misfired and injured the individual. Shortly after that the secession petition was withdrawn. In 1962, it seems the Missouri Highway Department learned their lesson and McDonald County was back on the map. As written by Patric Stevens for the McDonald County Historical Society: "The secession was not initially a publicity stunt, although it turned in a great one. It had real meaning to the people of McDonald County. The territorial uprising will be regarded in history as time when a small community organized and made the statement, 'We count, too. We don't want a government without representation.""

To have true representation we as citizens must make our voices heard and we do this by going to the polls. It doesn't really matter to me what party you support. It only matters that you don't waste your voice by not voting. Vote this November.

The Library describes the program as follows: "This year's election stakes are high, as always. But perhaps no presidential vote in U.S. history was more consequential than that of 1860.

The national roiled over the issue of slavery. Abraham Lincoln captured the Republican nomination over New York Sen. William Seward and then took on the divided Democratic party. His win in November – with less than 40% of the popular vote – prompted the immediate secession of South Carolina, roused the rest of the South, and ushered in the Civil War."

Don "Doc" Ballard, a Congressional Medal of Honor recipient who lives in Grain Valley, MO recently participated in the Heartland Outdoor Days at the Independence Bass Pro Shop. Don is an avid fisherman and hunter and is very generous with his time to appear at history events such as some that Sonny Wells, our first President, planned for the Round Table.

You have probably noticed articles and programs related to the centennial of our National Parks in August 2016. You may not think that Missouri has much to offer in the way of National Parks, but a recent listing showed several that you may not be aware of because they are National Historic Trails and stretch across many states including Missouri. They include the California Trail, the Lewis & Clark Trail, the Oregon Trail, the Pony Express Trail, the Santa Fe Trail, and the Trail of Tears. Missouri also has a National Scenic Riverway called the Ozark in Van Buren, Eminence, Salem, and Winona. We have a National Monument at Diamond, MO in honor of George Washington Carver, the "plant doctor." We have a National Historic Site right here in Independence, MO at the Harry S Truman home and in Grandview, MO at the Truman Farm. Another National Historic Site is the Ulysses S. Grant home and museum in St. Louis, MO. There is also a National Expansion Memorial at the Gateway Arch and the Old Courthouse in St. Louis. And finally we have a National Battlefield at Wilson's Creek in Republic, MO.

The **National Register of Historic Places** has turned 50 years old. It has some 90,540 total listings and growing daily. In fact the Union Cemetery in Kansas City, MO was recently added. Our Round Table has nominated the Little Blue Battlefield to be placed on the National Register so maybe it will be added some day. Recently the Harpers Ferry National Historical Park extended its boundary in West Virginia and Virginia because of its significance in archeology, industry, military and social history.

Matthew Stith who wrote our National Register nomination is now teaching at the University of Texas at Tyler. He has written a new book *Extreme Civil War: Guerrilla Warfare, Environment, and Race on the Trans-Mississippi Frontier.* It lists for \$42.50, but you may be able to buy it new through Amazon for \$32.25 plus \$3.99 shipping or used at \$29.37 plus \$3.99 shipping. A recent review says the following: "During the American Civil War the western Trans-Mississippi frontier was host to harsh environmental conditions, irregular warfare, and intense racial tensions that created extraordinarily difficult conditions."

We have received a note of good wishes from **Kathy Pickering** for our upcoming tour to Lexington, MO. She wishes she could be with us, but she now uses a wheelchair and has sight in just one eye. However she is still able to enjoy the *Border Star* newsletter and would enjoy receiving cards and letters at her home at The Groves. Cathay Williams, the black woman who disguised herself as a man to enlist in the army and became a Buffalo Soldier, was originally from Independence, Missouri. She has been honored with a bust in front of the Richard Allen Cultural Center, 412 Kiowa Street, Leavenworth, Kansas. This is in the City of Leavenworth rather than Fort Leavenworth where the Buffalo Soldier monument is located. It has become very difficult for non-military personnel to access Fort Leavenworth as evidenced by a letter to the Editor of the Kansas City Star called "Tourists rebuffed." This is made especially difficult for Missouri residents whose driver's license is not approved for entering federal installations; you have to take something extra such as a passport or birth certificate. However the staff person at the Richard Allen Cultural Center is able to provide an escort if you want to see the Buffalo Soldier equestrian statue. For a tour cost of \$5/person they will provide transportation Monday-Friday from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. You should call ahead to 913-682-8772 to make arrangements.

There is a museum of African-American history in Sedalia, Missouri called the **Rose M. Nolen Black History Library** located at 109 Lima Alley, Sedalia. There has been controversy about the museum because of the construction of a slave cabin on the grounds. You can go to <u>www.rosemnolenblackhistorylibrary.org</u> to learn more about the exhibits.

The Independence *Examiner* has been running a series of photographs called "Back to School." We enjoyed seeing the photo of young **Armin Schannuth** and the orange, white and black schoolbus and his big black lunch pail in the fall of 1946.

The State Historical Society of Missouri will have a new home by about 2019 in the proposed Center for Missouri Studies in Columbia, Missouri. The \$35 million building has been designed by Kansas Citybased Gould Evans architects and will be funded by state revenue bonds. It will be open to the public for historical research and will also house the society's administrative offices. Until then the offices are located at 1020 Lowry Street, Columbia, Missouri.

The new Education Outreach Coordinator of the State Historical Society of Missouri, **Alexandra Waetjen**, is introducing herself to historical groups. She will be steering the planning for the Missouri Bicentennial in 2021. One thing to watch out for is a Commemorative Bicentennial License Plate which can be issued to Missouri drivers from January 1, 2019 through the year 2021.

The State of Missouri is blessed with two state historical societies – one in Columbia, Missouri and one in St. Louis, Missouri. The **Missouri Historical Society** in St. Louis is celebrating 150 years of preserving history. On August 11, 1866, forty-seven individuals met at the Old Courthouse and voted to organize a historical society "for the purpose of saving from oblivion the early history of the city and state."

The William Clarke Quantrill Society

The William Clark Quantrill Society is a non-profit corporation dedicated to the study of the Civil War on the Missouri-Kansas border with emphasis on the lives of Quantrill, his men, his supporters, his adversaries and the resulting historical record.
