## President's Letter

Abraham Lincoln and Sarah Josepha Buell Hale share a bit of our American History. The day of thanks was celebrated in some form in New England with each state setting aside the date. Hale was an advocate of a national observance. She wrote to five presidents with the idea and the last, Lincoln, finally agreed. At the height of the Civil War, Lincoln set aside a national day of reflection and prayer; a day of thanksgiving. What an idea, in the middle of all the loss of life, to be thankful. What strength, to find something to be thankful for in the middle of the darkest hour of our country. What faith.

"The year that is drawing towards its close, has been filled with the blessings of fruitful fields and healthful skies. To these bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added, which are of so extraordinary a nature, that they cannot fail to penetrate and soften even the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever watchful providence of Almighty God. In the midst of a civil war of unequalled magnitude and severity, which has sometimes seemed to foreign States to invite and to provoke their aggression, peace has been preserved with all nations, order has been maintained, the laws have been respected and obeyed, and harmony has prevailed everywhere except in the theatre of military conflict; while that theatre has been greatly contracted by the advancing armies and navies of the Union. Needful diversions of wealth and of strength from the fields of peaceful industry to the national defense, have not arrested the plough, the shuttle, or the ship; the axe had enlarged the borders of our settlements, and the mines, as well of iron and coal as of the precious metals, have yielded even more abundantly than heretofore. Population has steadily increased, notwithstanding the waste that has been made in the camp, the siege and the battle-field; and the country, rejoicing in the consciousness of augmented strength and vigor, is permitted to expect continuance of vears, with large increase of freedom.

No human counsel hath devised nor hath any mortal hand worked out these great things. They are the gracious gifts of the Most High God, who, while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy.

It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and voice by the whole American people. I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens.

And I recommend to them that while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to his tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and to restore it as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility and Union.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed. Done at the city of Washington, this third day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and of the independence of the United States the eighty-eighth."

What's your KC Q? is a new column in the Kansas City Star to research and answer questions from readers. The burning question on Oct. 21<sup>st</sup> was "Why isn't Kansas City named for the state it is located in." We are all jarred by the comments from out-of-town celebrities who say they are "so glad to be in Kansas." The quick answer is that when the "Town of Kansas" was platted about 1839, it was not named for the State of Kansas because there was no such thing. It was all part of Nebraska Territory. Instead the name came from being located at the mouth of the Kansas River. In fact, one suggestion was that the new city be called Kawsmouth. The name for the Kansas River was a derivation of the Kansa Indians.
