The Cannon Will Go BOOM!!

Saturday, April 7, 2001, at 10:00 am, The Ferris Battery will have its annual Spring Muster at Joel and Dori's place, about five miles northwest of Clinton, Missouri.

The muster will include some drill, some practice, some training, and some live fire.

Spectators are welcome. Bring your own folding chairs and a snack for lunch.

The training session will be for those from our group who wish to learn the proper steps involved in loading and firing the cannon.

Boots and blue jeans are suggested. Shorts and halter tops, while appreciated by the gun crew, are not considered proper.

Directions to the Semler's are as follows: South on Highway 71 to Highway 7. Left on Highway 7, past Garden City and Creighton to County Highway 0, about 5 miles west of Clinton.

Left (North) on Highway O to 500th Street, approximately 1 1/8 miles. Right (East) on 500th to the Semler's place, or just watch for a bunch of cars.

The practice field is just across the road from the house.

The muster will last all day, but the live fire portion should be over by noon.

Car pooling has been suggested. Meet in the parking lot behind the Cracker Barrel at I-70 and Lee's Summit Road. Departure time is slated for 8:30 am. Bring your camera.

Land of Lincoln, Here We Come

In conjunction with Pastor Royce and the Jolly 60's Travel Club, there is planned a trip to the Lincoln sites around Springfield, Illinois, for the 15th and 16th of May.

The tour will include a visit to the Lincoln Home Visitors Center, a tour of the Lincoln Home, a tour of the Lincoln Historic District, a visit to the CNW Railroad Station, a tour of the Lincoln Tomb and mausoleum, a nightlites tour of the Illinois State Capitol and the Lincoln Historic District, a tour of the New Salem Visitors Center and the restored log home village of New Salem, a visit to the first grave of Ann Rutledge, and a stop in Hannibal on the way home.

This is a shared cost tour. Cost is estimated to be \$129.00 per person, based on double occupancy. That is \$70 less than the usual charge for this trip.

This includes room, all meals, the bus, all fees and taxes. It does not include coffee breaks, souvenirs, or tips.

Bring plenty of film as film is a bit pricey in the tourist area in the summer.

Battlefield Anniversary

This year is the 139th Anniversary of the Battle of Pea Ridge. On March 3rd and 4th, a celebration of the anniversary "began with the marching beat of a drum and fife and included a bagpipe version of Amazing Grace. It ended with the playing of Taps," according to *The Benton County Daily Record* reporter Shirley A. Johnson-Wolfe.

"The musical sounds reverberated Sunday afternoon throughout the woods surrounding Elkhorn Tavern at Pea Ridge National Military Park, stirring many to consider, perhaps for the first time, what actually happened at the site in 1862," writes Ms. Johnson-Wolfe.

In the first week of June, the \$300,000 remodeling and renovations to the Pea Ridge National Military Park Visitor Center will be completed. There will be a dedication, and the showcasing of a new film documentary and recently acquired Sam Curtis coats. Curtis was a Union commander who won a promotion for his performance at the Battle of Pea Ridge. The documentary, called "Shooting in the Woods," was made by reenactors this past winter.

The house was built in 1936 for a daughter of Tom Pendergast, and was significantly enlarged by the Berl Berry family in the 1950's.

What's in the News

The Kansas City Star reported on:

Civil War Graffiti (March 29, 2001)

Winchester, Virginia ----- Restoration crews working at an old courthouse have discovered Civil War era graffiti condemning Confederate President Jefferson Davis.

Someone wrote: "To Jeff. Davis: May he be set afloat...(on a) boat without compass or rudder...eaten by a shark, the shark by a whale, the whale in the Devil's belly, and the Devil in Hell, the gates locked...and, further, may he be put in the northwest corner with a southeast wind blowing ashes in his eyes for all ETERNITY."

The Frederick County Courthouse is being converted into a Civil War Museum.

Spielberg fires back (March 30, 2001)

A *Times* of London report that Steven Spielberg is planning a film that will portray Abraham Lincoln as a manic-depressive racist who nearly lost the American Civil War is "tabloid hogwash," Spielberg's spokesman says.

Marvin Levy confirmed that Spielberg had optioned a Lincoln book by historian Doris Kearns Goodwin. But the book isn't finished, and Spielberg "is waiting to see what the book says."

Goodwin says she doesn't portray Lincoln as a racist and she doesn't say Lincoln and his wife, Mary, were "the most dysfunctional first couple" in Washington history.

"That's totally fabricated," she said. "I never thought it, and I never said it."

Honest Abe, the beard's real!

This was the headline on the front page of the *Pleasant Hill Times*, on March 21, 2001, with a great picture and a caption that read: "Fourth grader Tamara Slayden tugs on Abe Lincoln's beard following the former President's visit to the Pleasant Hill Elementary School Friday morning and discovers that the whiskers are real. The 45 minute living history program was presented to students at the Elementary School by nationally-known Lincoln presenters Max and Donna Daniels of Wheaton, Ill."

Carla also donated a set of four sandstone coasters from the Mort Kunstler collection of Civil War battle scenes, which we will probably use for a raffle or auction item. We really appreciate her thoughtful gifts.

Harold Dellinger has donated a copy of "The Lykins Neighborhood Guidebook," which he was instrumental in producing as a KC150 project. This 94 page booklet is "everything you need to live in or visit the Lykins Neighborhood of Kansas City, Missouri." The boundaries of the area are from Truman Road to 24 Highway and Benton Boulevard to Hardesty. The Lykins Neighborhood gets its name from Dr. Johnston Lykins who is considered the first legal Mayor of Kansas City. He was a self-taught medical doctor, realtor, and Baptist missionary. It is interesting to note that he was married to Mattie Lykins, who later became the wife of George Caleb Bingham. On May 9, Katie Armitage will be presenting a program on Mattie Lykins Bingham to our group.

Sonny wells has received a donation from the Cass County Historical Society to the collection called <u>Cass</u> <u>County Missouri Families</u>, which is a 1976 reprint of an 1908 book.

Beverly Shaw will bring the Shelby Foote volumes, the Stonewall Jackson, and the Lykins Neighborhood book to the April meeting, if anyone would like to check them out.
