

THIS MONTH IN THE WAR: January 31, 1865. Washington. By a vote of 119 to 56, the House of Representatives passes the proposed constitutional amendment abolishing slavery throughout the United States. The amendment will now go to the states. It must be ratified by three-fourths of them before it will become part of the Constitution.

President Lincoln gives Secretary of State William H. Seward instructions concerning his upcoming conference with the Confederate peace commissioners. Lincoln insists that recognition of Federal authority is a necessary precondition to peace, while Davis still clings to independence as the only basis of negotiations.

Jay and Barbara Jackson travelled to Tennessee in 2014 to honor Jay's great uncle, Edward Chamberlain, and place a wreath on his grave at McGavock Confederate Cemetery. His final battle was at Franklin where the young Chamberlain was shot in the leg and died a few days later.

The American Historical Association honored the **Kansas City Library** with the Roy Rosenzweig Prize for Innovation in Digital History in October, 2014 for its historical website called "Civil War on the Western Border: The Missouri-Kansas Conflict, 1854-1865." The Kansas Humanities Council received the Helen and Martin Schwartz Prize in October, 2014 for its Twitter reenactment commemorating the 150th anniversary of Quantrill's Raid on Lawrence. The prize was awarded by the Federation of State Humanities Councils.

Our friends at Lecompton, Kansas were awarded a financial grant from Freedom's Frontier to help update their website. Lynn Ward, the new curator at the **Territorial Capital/Lane Museum**, and Paul Bahnmaier, President of the **Lecompton Historical Society** are spearheading this project.

The Missouri History Museum (St. Louis, MO) received the 2014 National Arts and Humanities Youth Program Award from Michelle Obama in November, 2014. This was in recognition of the Museum's "Teens Make History" program.

Dennis and Dorothy Myers pass by the **Historic Pitcher Cemetery** on their way home from work and stopped by recently. They looked for some of the brochures that **Kathy Tuohey** used to leave in a mailbox there but found it empty. They have volunteered to continue to supply the brochures in Kathy's honor. Dennis has brought the brochure up to date as a lasting memorial to Kathy who died in 2011. The Historic Pitcher Cemetery is located west of Blue Ridge Cutoff at 33rd Street in Independence, MO and was established about 1830. One of its famous burials is Ledstone Noland who fought in the American Revolutionary War. It is adjacent to the Phil Roberts Park where the Round Table has held picnics in the past.

Just a reminder that Platte County has celebrated its 175 anniversary with the publication of a book called *Platte County's History Illustrated*. This 70 page book is full color for \$25 at the Platte County Landmark Office and Ben Ferrell Museum in Platte City.

We want to congratulate a couple of our members who have recently retired. **Karen Wells** has retired as a legal secretary and the **Honorable Ron Taylor** has retired from being a Judge in St. Jospeh, MO. The legal community has lost two wonderful professionals.

Ripley's Believe It or Not had a drawing of **Henry Clay Thruston**, standing 7 feet, 7 inches tall, who was the tallest soldier in the Civil War. He fought for the Confederate army and toured with the Barnum and Bailey Circus after the war.

We have word from Larry Short of the Missouri **River Outfitters and Santa Fe Trail Association** that plans are proceeding for the open air kiosk and three historical panels to be placed at the Salem Park at the corner of 24 Highway and Blue Mills Road where there are two Battle of Little Blue markers. One is the low profile marker placed by the Civil War Round Table of Western Missouri which was recently refurbished by inserting a new color panel. The new panels will discuss the Blue Mills Landing and the Santa Fe Trail where it intersected with the Oregon and California Trails. The Jackson County Parks and Recreation will be increasing parking at this site. Plans are for the kiosk and markers to be in place by September 2015.

We received an acknowledgement from the **State Historical Society of Missouri** (Columbia, MO) for the copy of our new book, *Civil War Monuments and Memorials in Western Missouri*. We thanked them for the \$500 Brownlee Grant which helped us publish the book. Dean Hargett, Acquisition Librarian, wrote, "It is always nice to see what comes of the Brownlee grants and this is a fine result."

We have received word from former member **Connie McQuain** that **Sue Valentine** has been on the disabled list due to some invasive infections that necessitated the amputation of her right foot. The good news is that Connie and friends have been able to get her moved to an apartment on ground level so that she can recuperate at home after some rehab at Carmel Hills in Independence.
