THIS MONTH IN THE WAR:

July 7, 1865: The four alleged conspirators to kill President Lincoln are hanged at the Old Penitentiary in Washington. DC. There has been considerable public protest over the case of Mrs. Mary Surratt, whose guilt seems to come down to little more than that she kept the boarding house where Booth hatched his plot, but President Johnson refused to intervene. The other conspirators are imprisoned on an island off Key West, Florida. (Michael O'Laughlin dies of yellow fever in 1867; Dr. Samuel Mudd is pardoned in 1868 because of his work in the epidemic; and Edward Spangler and Samuel Arnold are pardoned in 1869.) From The Civil War Day by Day.

For their May 2015 meeting the Kansas City Round Table had as their speak Daniel Weinberg, owner of the Abraham Lincoln Book Shop in Chicago, IL. He has written a new book called Lincoln's Assassins: Their Trial and Execution.

President's Letter

Three things to consider:

1) History; 2) Slavery; 3) Flag

<u>History</u>

I am and always will be a strong advocate of telling history exactly like it happened; to do less would be a disservice to your listeners. If you don't tell the truth it's called fiction. Tell the story with sensitivity, but tell the truth. As always when you study history make sure of the facts and draw out the lesson to be learned. The study of the past will prepare you for your future.

<u>Slavery</u>

The root cause of the American Civil War was slavery. If you doubt this read three things. First, read any of the minutes from a secessionist convention that voted to secede. Slavery will be the main tenant for the reasoning to abolish the Union. It may be wrapped in state's rights or tariffs, but the south's way of life and economy was founded on the possession of chattel. Let there be no mistake: the holding of another person against his will, in bondage is wrong and forever will be wrong.

Flag

You can't miss it. It dominates printed media and the airwaves. It would seem that the majority of the citizens of the United States are for removing the Confederate States of America battle flag from every place it can be seen. Maybe they're right. Maybe it's time to place, in the background, the most devisive period in our history. I don't know enough to agree totally with either camp of thought. I do know that I believe that there is a time and a place to fly this flag. Most certainly it should be placed on the graves of Confederate soldiers who lost their life during the Civil War. These men died for a cause they believed in. It should not fly by itself on the graves of Ex-Confederate soldiers. These are the soldiers that fought in the war and then returned peacefully to the Union. Their graves should be decorated with the Confederate battle flag and the Stars and Stripes to honor both their service to the Confederate States and to their peaceful return to the Union.

I know that all will not agree with what I've written. I welcome and encourage a true and honest exchange of reasoning both for and against the display of the battle flag. Let's seek an understanding of each side of the issue. Do we erase history or do we learn from it?

The Hughes family is very proud of their son-in-law, **Theodore Knox**, who received the bronze star medal with valor on May 9, 2015 at the WWI Museum at Liberty Memorial for action in Vietnam.

The **Platte County Historical Society** was formed 70 years ago and we sent a congratulatory card.

Doubtless you have read various articles about the use of the Confederate battle flag at public locations, especially after the slaughter of black citizens in their own church by a man who proudly displayed the flag. If you have not kept up with all this and don't receive the articles by E-Mail that Beverly Shaw has distributed, she will be glad to make you photocopies upon request. Call her at (816) 225-7944. In the meantime she has also received notice of some helpful efforts towards reconciliation as we finish commemorating the 150th anniversary of the Civil War. One occasion was the notice from Reno, Nevada of a recent military funeral for Pvt. Scott Carnal of the 1st Kansas Colored Infantry because it is unlikely he received any recognition after his death in 1917 in Dayton, about 40 miles south of Reno. The United States Colored Troops made up over 10% of the Union Army, while only 1% of the North's population was black, according to the African American Civil War Memorial and Museum in Washington, D.C. After President Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation took effect on January 1, 1863, the War Department publicly authorized recruiting of blacks. "Without the military help of the black freedmen, the

war against the South could not have been won," Lincoln said. Our friend, Joe Mattox, is presenting a series of programs at the Battle of Westport Museum to explain how some blacks fought for the North and their own freedom and some fought for the Confederacy.

The Mormon church is planning to index records of about four million former slaves and make them available to search on-line. They will use records of the Freedmen's Bureau, an agency Congress created at the end of the Civil War to help the first generation of African-Americans experience freedom. LDS Apostle D. Todd Chrisofferson called on the nation's African-Americans to help with the project to "potentially reunite the black family that was once torn apart by slavery." Speaking in Los Angeles at the California African American Museum, he urged finishing the indexing of 1.4 million digitized records before completion next year of the new Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture on the mall in Washington, D.C.

Closer to home we were glad to read about the students of **Academie Lafayette** in Kansas City who have cleaned up and placed flags at the neglected African American Highland Cemetery in unincorporated Jackson County off Blue Ridge Boulevard. Some significant graves are those of jazz great **Bennie Moten**; **Lafayette Tillman**, the city's first black policeman whom Daryl Levings wrote about in a long piece in the *Kansas City Star magazine*; and **Chester A. Franklin** who in 1919 founded the *Kansas City Call*, a leading African-American newspaper.

Our long-distance member, **Nancy Hitt** from Kentucky, keeps us informed of Civil War events in Europe. She says that **CSA General Patrick Cleburne** will be honored in Ireland on July 4, 2015. She wonders if there will be a memorial in Arkansas where he is buried. She also reports that plans are being made for a grand event in Liverpool, England to remember the famous ship **CSS Alabama** and that city's connections to the War for Southern Independence.


