President's Letter

"Almighty God: Our sons, pride of our Nation, this day have set upon a mighty endeavor, a struggle to preserve our Republic, our religion, and our civilization, and to set free a suffering humanity.

Lead them straight and true; give strength to their arms, stoutness to their hearts, steadfastness in their faith.

They will need Thy blessings. Their road will be long and hard. For the enemy is strong. He may hurl back our forces. Success may not come with rushing speed, but we shall return again and again; and we know that by Thy grace, and by the righteousness of our cause, our sons will triumph.

For these men are lately drawn from the ways of peace. They fight not for the lust of conquest. They fight to end conquest. They fight to liberate. They fight to let justice arise, and tolerance and good will among all Thy people. They yearn but for the end of battle, for their return to the haven of home.

Some will never return. Embrace these, Father, and receive them, Thy heroic servants, into Thy kingdom.

And for us at home -- fathers, mothers, children, wives, sisters, and brothers of brave men overseas -- whose thoughts and prayers are ever with them--help us, Almighty God, to rededicate ourselves in renewed faith in Thee in this hour of great sacrifice.

Many people have urged that I call the Nation into a single day of special prayer. But because the road is long and the desire is great, I ask that our people devote themselves in a continuance of prayer. As we rise to each new day, and again when each day is spent, let words of prayer be on our lips, invoking Thy help to our efforts.

Give us strength, too -- strength in our daily tasks, to redouble the contributions we make in the physical and the material support of our armed forces.

And let our hearts be stout, to wait out the long travail, to bear sorrows that may come, to impart our courage unto our sons where so ever they may be.

And, O Lord, give us Faith. Give us Faith in Thee; Faith in our sons; Faith in each other; Faith in our united crusade. Let not the keenness of our spirit ever be dulled. Let not the impacts of temporary events, of temporal matters of but fleeting moment let not these deter us in our unconquerable purpose.

With Thy blessing, we shall prevail over the unholy forces of our enemy. Help us to conquer the apostles of greed and racial arrogances. Lead us to the saving of our country, and with our sister Nations into a world unity that will spell a sure peace a peace invulnerable to the schemings of unworthy men. And a peace that will let all of men live in freedom, reaping the just rewards of their honest toil.

Thy will be done, Almighty God. Amen. "

I can't say it any better. These are the words that should be on every American's heart. On this Veterans Day please remember not only those who have served but, also those who continue to sacrifice for you and for me. Please remember these words for those we owe so much and have repaid so little.

News About Members and Friends

We were so sorry to learn that our friend **Vicki Beck** passed away on October 2, 2015. She had given us a program back in May on her new book about Kate Quantrill. She was a great researcher of local history and helped in the efforts to mark the Smith Cemetery in Raytown. We extend our condolences to her husband Steve and their children and grandchildren.

The October 10, 2015 issue of the *Examiner* had an article about the DAR activities to celebrate Constitution Week. There was a picture of **Bob and Carolyn Grover** with the committee chair. Bob had given a program on September 25th to the fourth grade students of Raymore Elementary School when he shared information about his period uniform and the soldiers' experiences during the war. Bob volunteers at many functions as a member of the Missouri Society Sons of the American Revolution. Carolyn gave us a program on her research about the orphan trains.

The **Missouri Historical Society** in St. Louis announced in October that the Emerson Company has awarded a \$5 million grant over seven years to help with an African-American History Endowment fund to increase its collections, exhibitions, and programs on African-American history.

The National Archives in Kanas City has announced new hours beginning November 1, 2015. They will be open Monday-Friday, 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. The decision was made on the national level following a close examination of usage trends.

The October 8th Kansas City *Star* featured the Owens-McCoy House in Independence which is owned by **Brian and Sharon Snyder**. They are using high-tech, 3-D laser scanning equipment to examine shifting exterior brick walls. They would like to reduce the amount of traffic going by the house as they try to stabilize the house. Or they may opt to demolish part of the west wall and build a historically accurate reproduction of a long-demolished wing.

The Arts and Culture section of the October 11th issue of the Kansas City *Star* had an article about a local branch of the **Sons of Confederate Veterans**, the Major Thomas J. Key Camp No. 1920. **Lane Smith** who presented our program on Robert E. Lee and portrayed Lee in the play "Road to Appomattox" is pictured with other members.

About 100 years ago the *Examiner* printed a serial version of a story of the Civil War called **"The Red Mist" by Randall Parrish**. It is the adventures of a Confederate in the Federal Lines and promised rapid action, disguises, incessant danger, capture, escape, pursuit, and ultimate safety. Apparently the story was eventually printed as a book before 1923. A reproduction is available on Amazon, but there are warnings of imperfections in the copy.

Increase in Dues

The Board has determined that the Round Table needs to increase dues because of higher expenses than in the past.
