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

Dear Mom:

By the time you receive this letter, I will have already left on my journey, a quest that will carry me to far away places to research facts of the Civil War. I must do this in order to grasp a better understanding of how a country as great as ours could have been divided and waged war upon itself.

I will write again later when I have more information to pass on. I have enclosed some journal entries I have made thus far. I hope that you will find

my growing knowledge of the Civil War interesting and of value.

Your American son: The Civil War-yer

TAKEN FROM THE JOURNAL OF THE CIVIL WAR-YER AUGUST 1863

While riding south of Kansas City, I ran into a large group of men, around 300 or so. All were mounted on fine horses, and dressed for battle, most carrying up to six revolvers. I was quickly surrounded and held at bay. The leader, who was identified as William Clarke Quantrill, and three other men approached me. Quantrill asked if I had seen any Federal troops. I told him no, I had not. After a brief interrogation, his conversation turned to a more personal note. Quantrill told me of how a few years ago a group of Jennison's men attacked his brother, himself and a negro companion, killing his brother, taking the negro and all supplies, and left him for dead. After his recovery, he joined the "Jennisons" to gain information so that he could plan his revenge. He went on about accomplishing this during a raid at the Morgan Walker farm, about eight miles north of Blue Springs, Missouri. After spending an hour or so talking to him, I decided to ride with him to Lawrence, Kansas with the understanding that I was going as an observer, as I have no reason to wage war on the people there.

We rode for several hours so I had plenty of time to talk to the men. I can see that these men have spent many days in the woods, away from their families, and have fought a tiring war. It has been brought to my attention that at least three groups of men joined together to complete the mission, a mission to get revenge for raids pulled by the "Redlegs" and the "Jayhawkers" in Missouri.

The only orders I have heard given are, "Kill or die, but no one is to molest old men, women or children." Today we are camped about 20 miles outside of Lawrence. Quantrill and some of his men are planning their attack. I hope that I never have to face these men in battle. Being an outsider, I am not allowed to attend this meeting, but I can see the rivers of redness flowing in the men's eyes, and I know that tomorrow's battle will be a bloody one.
