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President's Letter

History Bias

Bias: noun - an inclination of temperament or outlook especially: a personal and sometimes unreasoned judgment; synonyms: favor, non-objectivity, one-sidedness.

Verb - to give a settled and often prejudiced outlook to.

Do we view history with bias? Are we guilty of history prejudice? Are we so focused on our own interpretation of historical events we exclude the viewpoint of others? Have we used a tainted historiography searching only for the conclusion that supports our view?

Have you ever read an eyewitness of a civil war soldier? If you have you might have asked yourself; what battle was that guy in? I have just finished rereading John McCorkle, William Gregg, Harrison Trow and Tom Jewett's accounts of the first Battle of Independence. Let's just say each recounted something different. It's not that they weren't there. It's just that each one only saw what was in front of them and if you add a few years between the event and the telling, the story gets even more muddied. As a reader, we don't dispute that they lived the history. (Just a note some individuals do sometimes recount events which they didn't participate in). Each account is very personal and retells only what was in their line of sight. The point is that we as students of history should not be biased in our understanding. We each can, and will, interpret differently, just like the soldiers.

History is personal. That statement is true whether it's the history of your family or an event many miles away and years in the past. I only ask that before we express our viewpoint on a historical subject that we take time to consider the other person's viewpoint and, most importantly, do your homework. I'm not saying either side is totally correct. I'm only saying without a full and complete understanding that considers both sides of the event, we may be guilty of history bias. There's no requirement that we agree. The only requirement is that we consider both sides of the story.

News About Members and Friends

Chuck Townsend, Mike Calvert's brother-in-law, passed away January 21, 2021 from COVID. He was a longtime employee of Speaks Chapels in Independence, Missouri. Chuck was very supportive of the Civil War Round Table of Western Missouri when we lost our late President, Tim Cox.

The Civil War community in Missouri lost **John H.** "**Jack**" **Chance** February 12, 2021. Jack made a commemorative park at the site of the Centralia Battlefield.

The American Battlefield Trust recently wrote about a "Road to Freedom" map that is available through the **Civil War Trails** organization. It focuses on the African American experience in Civil

War-era Virginia. It unleashes the power of place and draws upon the perspectives of historical figures whose stories we should know, highlighting concepts of self-emancipation and empowerment that had been lacking in historical interpretation. We have recently learned from Tom Rafiner that the "Cass County Exodus Mural" has been accepted into the permanent art collection of The State Historical Society of Missouri. It was a collaboration between Tom and artist Brian Hawkins of Harrisonville, MO. The Round Table Board voted to donate \$100 towards the cost of framing the mural so that it can be hung in a gallery in Columbia, MO.

David Trowbridge from Marshall University at Huntington, West Virginia, was the Lincoln speaker for the University of St. Mary in Leavenworth, KS, February 15, 2021. His topic was "Monumental History, The Civil War Era in History Memory." One of the slides he showed was of the "Burnt District Monument" at Harrisonville, Missouri. As an aside to his topic, Trowbridge gave information about The Clio, a website that he started as a place to research Appalachian history but which has expanded to a general history with many walking tours. It is interactive so that other history groups can add their own tours. To sample some of the tours, you can go to www.TheClio.com.

The Black Jack Battlefield and Nature Park near Baldwin City, Kansas has an ambitious plan to improve its historic site. The Battle of Black Jack took place June 2, 1856, when antislavery forces led by John Brown attacked the encampment of Henry C. Pate. Some maintain that this was the first battle of the Civil War and was certainly an early episode of "Bleeding Kansas." Our friend and John Brown reenactor, Kerry Altenbernd, is on their Board.

The Woodneath Press at the Mid-Continent Public Library has produced a new book about Alexander Doniphan called *The Will of Missouri: The Life, Times and Influence of Alexander William Doniphan*. It is now available on Amazon for \$25 in paperback. If you want to buy it there, you might want to choose Amazon Smile and sign up to have a percentage donated to the Civil War Round Table of Western Missouri. Winter Reading Challenge

The Winter Reading Challenge from the Mid-Continent Public Library asks you to read five books – yours, the library's, whatever – between Jan. 15th and March 15th and log that at the library's website (www.mymcpl.org/Winter-Reading). You get a coffee mug and will be entered into a drawing for other prizes. "But the real reward is reading something new," says library director Steve Potter. This year's Winter Reading Challenge theme is Missouriana since 2021 is the State's bicentennial (though those in the program can read any books they choose. Here are some suggestions:

- The Devil Knows How to Ride: The True Story of William Clarke Quantrill and His Confederate Raiders by Edward E. Leslie.
- George Caleb Bingham: Missouri's Famed Painter and Forgotten Politician by Paul Nagel, an Independence native.
- Year of Decisions by Harry S.Truman.
- Ruling over Monarchs, Giants & Stars: Umpiring in the Negro Leagues & Beyond by Bob Motley.
- *A Hole in the World* by Richard Rhodes, an Independence native and student at the Drumm Farm.

Pajama Activities

Since people have gotten so used to working from home in their pajamas, there is a whole new set of virtual activities. One might be to view some of the programs presented by the Friends of the Missouri State Archives. A recent program was on "Finding the Trail of Tears in Missouri." You can go to www.sos.mo.gov/archives/about/presentations. Another is from the Westport Historical Society, a source for local, state, and national history. Its first program is "Remember the Ladies" by Alisha Cole about the 19th Amendment and the women's suffrage movement.
