<u>THIS MONTH IN THE WAR</u>: Eastern Theater: The Battle of Cold Harbor, VA is characterized by a series of fruitless attacks as Lee and Grant sought to outflank the other. Finally on June 3, 1864, Grant orders a direct assault which results in 7,000 Federal troops killed and wounded in one half hour. The bodies "fall in waves like mown wheat." Grant finally realizes he must move his army south across the James River to threaten Petersburg, the back door to Richmond. Petersburg did not fall until April 3, 1865.

"In God We Trust"

From an essay by John F. Marszalek, the Giles distinguished professor emeritus of history at Mississippi State University.

In 1956 during the Cold War, the U. S. Congress passed and President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed a resolution mandating the words "In God We Trust" as the official motto of the United States.

In fact, these words were actually the product of the Civil War. On Nov. 13, 1861, a minister from a small town in Pennsylvania urged Secretary of the Treasury Salmon P. Chase to place on American coins an indication that the United States was a Christian nation whose God supported its battle against the slave-holding South.

On April 22, 1864, Congress passed a law authorizing a 2-cent coin with this motto on it. On March 3, 1865, Congress expanded permission for the motto to appear on a variety of gold and silver coins. The motto lived a quiet existence, used on some American coinage, but not universally mandated by congress. The 1956 law then required it on all currency.

No Civil War legislation has influenced the national for so long a time as this motto. In 2011, the House of Representatives reaffirmed it, and a variety of court cases pop up regularly calling for its elimination. Some Americans take it less seriously, however. Over the years, "In God We Trust, All Others Pay Cash" has appeared on signs in more than a few mercantile shops.

The one at Blue Mills Road and 24 Highway is very faded and crackled, and the one at Ripley Junction Park on the Little Blue Trace hiking and biking trail has been vandalized. The whole frame has been bowed by some heavy duty vehicle. The Round Table would like to thank **Dana Johnston** for his generosity in providing funds for the replacement of the frame and for new tablets for both markers. We have heard that Jackson County Parks in coordination with the Santa Fe Trails Association would like to erect a kiosk at Blue Mills Road and 24 Highway to shelter the three markers standing there – one from the DAR to mark the Santa Fe Trail, the older style metal marker to show the location of a portion of the Battle of the Little Blue on October 21, 1864, and our more modern low-profile marker with text, pictures, and graphics.

The display of the **Confederate battle flag** is again causing discussion. In April a Blue Springs high school student allegedly displayed a flag on school grounds and the situation was promptly addressed by school officials. In May the Sons of Confederate Veterans met with Missouri lawmakers about restoring the Confederate flag to fly over the Confederate Memorial Cemetery at Higginsville. About ten years ago the Confederate flag was removed from two state historic sites.

Burns chronicled 50 great boys who memorized the **Gettysburg Address** as a part of their curriculum at the Greenwood School in Putney, VT. It specializes in teaching boys with learning disabilities. The program is called "The Address" and is worth watching .

On January 16, 2014 the JCHS presented the following outstanding awards for 2013: **Unity School** for restoration and adaptive reuse of Unity's iconic water tower for offices and health center; **Ralph A. Monaco II** for historical book of the year *Scattered to the Four Winds: Order No. 11 and Martial Law in Jackson County, Missouri, 1863*; **Rice-Tremonti House** for "Bringing History to Life;" **Gail Fines** for Archives and Research Center Volunteer; and **Frances Gabbard** for 1859 Jail Museum Volunteer of the year.

While on vacation in Minnesota Beverly Shaw read an article in the St. Paul *Pioneer Press* about the origins of Mother's Day in the U. S. Credit goes to Anna Jarvis of West Virginia who lobbied for a day to honor all mothers while grieving her own, Ann Reeves Jarvis who died in 1905. Her mother was a longtime Sunday school teacher who organized a "friendship" church picnic in the years after the Civil War for the families of Confederate and Union soldiers. On the second anniversary of her mother's death, she distributed 500 white carnations, her mother's favorite flower.

We are happy to hear that **Charles and Claudetta McCorkendale** were honored for their contributions to the Ray County Historical Society and Museum at the April 17 quarterly meeting of the group. The guest speaker was Darryl Levings of the Kansas City Star who spoke about his book *Saddle the Pale Horse* which we also enjoyed at our 20th anniversary luncheon. Darryl had listed the Ray County Museum as one of his Top 10 little-known Civil War resources in the Kansas City area. Darryl also had a very interesting feature article in the March 30, 2014 issue of the *Star Magazine* about "Missouri's History, Told in French" about a rogue explorer named Bourgmont who found redemption as the first European explorer in Missouri about 300 years ago.

We have not seen the **McCorkendales** recently because Charles underwent back surgery in March to relieve pain in his back and legs. He claims that his physical therapist must be kin to nurse Ratchett: "Where is that walker? Where is that gate belt? Did you take your pain med? Sit up close and hold on to that chair before you get up. Did you do all your PT instructions?" And a lot more that he can't mention.
