We appreciate the efforts of the **Oxford University Press** to keep publishing Civil War books. The latest is called *Appomattox: Victory, Defeat and Freedom at the End of the Civil War* by historian Elizabeth R. Varon. She tries to present a new, more accurate interpretation of Appomattox's meaning. From the start, the peace was uneasy, fragile, and fraught which was reflected in varying degrees of renewal and reform during Reconstruction. Oxford is sending the Round Table a review copy.

The 35 souls who still reside in **Papinville, Missouri** in Bates County are to be congratulated for the front page article in the *Kansas City Star* on September 26, 2013 called "They won't let go of this town." The town was established in 1847 and has an historic cemetery, bridge, and a museum. It was burned by Order No. 11 on August 25, 1863 and has been placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Many of you have probably visited the **Pea Ridge National Military Park** in northwest Arkansas. It's now being threatened by a new high voltage electrical transmission line that would sever the main Pea Ridge Battlefield from the Little Sugar Creek Battlefield and Battle at Dunigan's Farm. Hopefully the Public Service Commission will listen to citizens and Civil War tourists to keep the lines away from the Park.

We are happy to announce that the veteran's stone for Hiram Robinson has been installed at Mound Grove Cemetery in Independence, Missouri, and may now be viewed across from the Joseph Smith marker, accessible from Gate 3 of the cemetery. Richard Stewart obtained the stone from the VA because there were no descendants to request it. Mound Grove set the stone free of charge and the Round Table paid the modest perpetual care fee. Hiram Robinson stood guard at Lincoln's casket and later moved to Independence, Missouri. Since the time Richard obtained the stone, the VA has changed the rules so that only family members can request a government stone and not even then if the grave is already marked by a family stone. These new regulations will reduce the number of Civil War veterans whose graves will be appropriately marked. Another of Richard's historical interests is the Quantrill Collection at the Benton County (Arkansas) Historical Society. He has donated many hours to assembling the collection and in research about the Quantrill guerrillas. You can read the results of his research on three blogspots:

Many are buried at Shore Cemetery in Sni-A-Bar Chapel Hill in southern Lafayette County. Phillips who married Amanda Jane Harris, and the Joyner family, please give Michael a call at (314) 724-8266.

Bonnie Sommerville from Higginsville, Missouri, has been able to mark the Dawson W. Arnold gravesite in the Hollywood Cemetery at Richmond, Virginia at the falls of the James River. Her maiden name was "Arnold" so whenever she travels she makes it a point to see if that family name appears. She found that Private Arnold of the 5th Florida Infantry was listed as buried there but did not have a stone. The stone was requested and installed in 2013.

Our friends at the **Union Cemetery Historical Society** have announced that they are researching a new book about Union Cemetery to be published by Star Books. It will tell the history of Westport and Kansas City through intimate portrayals of those buried there. It will not just be about the well-known but everyday folks as well.
