# Official Publication of the Civil War Round Table of Western Missouri "Studying the Border War and Beyond"

THIS MONTH IN THE WAR: The Chattanooga Campaign was a series of maneuvers and battles in October and November, 1863. The Confederate Army of Tennessee under General Braxton Brag besieged Rosencrans by occupying key high terrain around Chattanooga. General Grant opened a supply line (the "Cracker Line") to feed his starving men and animals. On November 23, 1863, General William T. Sherman made a surprise attack on Missionary Ridge. On November 24th, Major General Joseph Hooker defeated the Confederates in the Battle of Lookout Mountain. On November 25th, Thomas' army surged to the top of Missionary Ridge and routed the Army of Tennessee which eliminated the last Confederate control of Tennessee and opened the door to an invasion of the Deep South leading to Sherman's Atlanta Campaign of 1864.

# **President's Letter**

"Of the 16,112,566 Americans in uniform during the Second World War, the number still living was expected to decline to one million by late 2014, and, a decade later, in 2024, to dip below a hundred thousand. By the year 2036, U.S government demographers estimated, fewer than four hundred veterans would remain alive, less than half the strength of a infantry battalion. Yet the war and all that the war contained—nobility, villainy, immeasurable sorrow—is certain to live on even after the last old soldier has gone to his grave. May the earth lie lightly on his bones."

Though for a time the memorial seemed to be part of a political agenda. The men and women who served our country during that war deserve our eternal honor and gratitude. A very good friend of mine's mother was on the last Honor Flight to go to the memorial. It was amazing to see the media frenzy that surrounded her upon her return to KC. We have forgotten that almost 400,000 women served in the Army and Navy Nurses Corps, Women's Army Corps (WACS), Navy (WAVES), Coast Guard (SPARS) and Marine Corps Reserves during WWII. Women served in many ways. From taking over a typewriter to serving in front line hospital units each served their country with honor and valor. It's time to remember their war, to remember their sacrifice and to remember to thank all veterans.

Since this will be the last letter before the end of the year I want thank everyone for their support and help throughout the year. I wish all of you and your families the best of holidays and a wonderful and prosperous new year.

We have word that the tombstones of **Alexander Majors' grandparents, Alexander and Catherine**, have been re-installed at the Farmer's Cemetery near the town of Franklin in what is now Simpson County, Kentucky. They join the ranks of Lincoln, Boone, Bowie and countless emigrants who went west across the Mississippi River in the 1800s.

#### The National Frontier Trails Museum in

Independence announces in an article in the *Examiner* on October 8, 2013, that they plan to replace the stolen bronze statue of the Pioneer Woman. A new artist's rendering appeared with the article. They also hope to solicit help in moving the Pioneer Log Cabin now on the grounds of the Sermon Center to join the buildings at the Trails Museum.

The **Maj. Gen. Sterling Price Missouri Confederate Soldier Monument** in the Springfield (MO) National Cemetery will be restored at the Polich-Tallix Foundry in Rock Tavern, N.Y., a process that may take four to six month. Two other monuments will also be repaired as a part of the stimulus act. They are the Union Memorial with the lone infantryman gazing down on the cemetery entrance from Seminole Street and a smaller marble pillar honoring Gen. Nathaniel Lyon.

**Ely S. Parker**, a Tonawanda Seneca from western New York, has been called the "Indian at Appomattox" according to the Disunion article in the *New York Times* 

series. In September, 1861 he requested a commission from Secretary of State William H. Steward and was refused because the war was "an affair between white men." However because of his friendship with Union general Ulysses S. Grant, he ended up as his aide and confidant at Appomattox and was the person who actually transcribed the final copy of the surrender, thus being the last person to put ink to paper before the two famous generals scrawled their names.

A former reporter with the Kansas City Star, Richard A. Serrano, has written a new book called Last Days of the Blue and Gray in which he debunks the claims of several old men who told stories of battles when the centennial of the Civil War was observed in the 1960's. He details their deceptions after turning to the pension records where he found that some of them had not even been born yet. Still several received notoriety and pensions too as well as the thanks of grateful nation. In spite of such incidents it is still important to preserve the memories and honor the actions of our true veterans. The City of Independence Veterans History Project tries to do this by interviewing local veterans of World War I, World War II. and the Korean. Vietnam. and Persian Gulf wars. These interviews are preserved at the Library of Congress, the Jackson County Historical Society, and the Truman Memorial Building Veterans' Hall. Jay Thorn has enjoyed talking with a lady at the Clay County Museum about a "mortuary box" she inherited from her grandfather who was a courier for generals at several battles and was captured at Vicksburg. They recently opened a memo-holder and found Confederate money along with receipts for construction of the monument at Fairview Cemetery in Liberty. Jay was also kind enough to pass along to the Round Table a copy of a transcribed diary of Judge Alonzo H. Shelton and his four years of service during the War between the States. The original hand-written copy is housed at William Jewell College, and the original typed copy is at the Clay County Museum.
