THIS WEEK IN THE WAR: Battle of Fort Donelson (TN) – February 13-16, 1862.

The fall of this Confederate bastion on the Cumberland River resulted in the loss of Southern military influence in Kentucky and Northwest Tennessee and led to the surrender of Nashville, the first Southern Capital to fall into Union hands. It also established the reputation of General U.S. Grant, who demanded "unconditional and immediate surrender" of the fort.

President's Letter

"In heaven's name, while we remember the dead let us not forget the living."

As the Civil War ended and the men, at least in the eastern armies, made their grand march in final review down the streets of Washington, DC, I'm sure their thoughts were about going home and taking up life where they left four years before. Most men were able to do just that. There were the adjustments for sure but by and large, most were able to become civilians again. As the years passed and they grew older, greyer and less firm of body, they became the old soldier from that war who were brought out on holidays to march down streets, to end up at a cemetery to salute their fallen comrades. There were monuments to be raised and national veteran's encampments to go to. They were much older, but still part of the community.

Not all soldiers returned to their former lives so easily. "They had come to see the war of their youth as a kind of lost golden age." Separated by emotional and physical disabilities from their non veteran neighbors they began to feel less a part of the community. They began to feel less important and more isolated. Alcohol misuse and in some cases suicide were the remedies sought by these veterans to end their despair.

In the United States today there are 21.9 million veterans. We watch the news stories of the returning troops and we all know some veterans personally. Let's vow today that their sacrifice will not be forgotten and we will honor them not only with monuments of stone and metal, but by ensuring they receive the medical, financial and emotional help they have earned and deserve.

If you have a trip to Boston planned, you might want to include a visit to the **African Meeting House** (at 205 years the oldest black church in the U.S.). An article and photo appeared in the January 1, 2012 *Star Magazine* in honor of a painstaking restoration of the three-story brick building where Frederick Douglass, William Lloyd Garrison, and other prominent abolitionists railed against slavery.

The **Bates County Museum** recently received a remarkable collection of Bates County history from **Eddie and Shirley Hermann**. For many years Eddie

wrote the weekly column “Historical Happenings” in the *News Xpress*. This is a good reminder that if any of you have archival collections that you don’t think will be kept intact, you might consider making a living donation to a local historical museum.

The **Bates County Museum** has completed the process of transferring the 1894 Sheriff’s Residence and Jail to the Bates County Sheriff’s Posse for restoration. The Museum has also received a Brownlee grant of \$500 in order to design a new permanent exhibit depicting the Battle of Island Mound. They are working with Missouri State Parks to plan the dedication of Island Mound as the newest State Historic Site on October 27, 2012.

The **Ray County Museum** is looking forward to working with Robbie Maupin to observe the 150th anniversary of the Battle of Albany in October 2014. The William Clarke Quantrill Society

The William Clark Quantrill Society is a non-profit corporation dedicated to the study of the Civil War on the Missouri-Kansas border with emphasis on the lives of Quantrill, his men, his supporters, his adversaries and the resulting historical record.
