Many of you know that the Round Table owns the Louis-Gregg Cemetery. The cemetery is 185 years old which would make it one of the oldest in Jackson County. This weekend we will be gathering at this cemetery to clean head stones. We will do this not only to extend the life of the stone, but more importantly to honor the person buried beneath it. Whether we know the deceased or not we owe them our respect. So come out this weekend, spend some time in a cemetery, and take time to stop, slow down and enjoy the surroundings.

Tips for Photographers

Civil War Monuments book, Vol. 2

The publication committee for Vol. 2 of our "Monuments" book is composed of Barbara Wormington, Beverly Shaw, Karen Wells, Dennis Myers, and Steve Hatcher. They are currently reviewing around 100 sites that have identified as possibilites for Vol. 2, but they need the help of the membership to actually visit the locations, take pictures, write a description, and provide directions. Please save the attached tips on photography and a sample matrix for reporting. Barbara and Denis Wormington visited the Battle of Albany in Ray County and share the result of their reporting as a sample. If you need help preparing your digital camera for pictures, please bring the camera and any instructions to the next meeting and Denis will take a look at it. The Round Table also has a digital camera that can be checked out if you don't have your own. Call Beverly Shaw at (816) 225-7944 to reserve it. We hope to publish Vol. 2 in color so the quality of our pictures is important, and after the trees and grass have greened up is a good time to take photos.

We are assuming most of us will be using a digital "point and shoot" camera. Assuming that to be the case, here are a few suggestions that will help us greatly to maintain consistency in our photographs.

- First, remember to turn off your date stamp!
- Second, leave plenty of space around your subject. Avoid the tendency to "crop" with your camera. We have computer software that will let us edit images so the composition will be just as we need it to be for publishing.
- If possible, turn off the digital zoom feature on your camera and zoom in manually. Zooming in digitally causes loss of image quality. (Digital zoom is basically a digital crop within the camera. It is not a true magnification. When you use digital zoom you are effectively capturing only part of an image, with less detail and lower resolution.)
- Because using a flash creates a flat picture, try to use natural light whenever possible. But be wary of shadows. If you're shooting an outdoor monument, strive for full-on sun or full-on shadow. The best lighting will have the sun in front of the subject being photographed.
- Take "large" pictures for the best image quality use the highest resolution setting on your camera. Images of 5 megapixels or larger are preferred.
- Take several shots of each subject and be sure to include one that is "square on."
- Feel free to submit as many pictures as you wish. Include all images you believe might add interest to the subject or location; the more we have to choose from the better!
- Once you've chosen your favorite shots, send each one as a separate attachment to us at <u>bwormington@kc.rr.com</u>.
- Please attach no more that a total of 10MB to each email (as larger files might not transfer.)

TITLE & APPROXIMATE LOCATION

1. Battle of Albany Monument

Near the present town of Orrick, MO

DESCRIPTION

Battle of Albany Monument, located at the battlefield, honors eleven Missouri Partisan Rangers who died there.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE

On October 26, 1864, a company of Missouri Partisan Rangers CSA led by Capt. William T. ("Bloody Bill") Anderson was camped near this spot. Three hundred men of the 51st and 33rd Missouri Militia Mounted Infantry U.S. led by Maj. Samuel P. Cox of Gallatin, Missouri were camped several miles away on the other side of Albany. A Union woman rode to Major Cox's camp and told him where Captain Anderson's company was camped. Major Cox led his men to a tree line next to the battlefield and they dismounted. Then Lieutenant Baker, with a squad of cavalry, was sent to attack Captain Anderson's company. Captain Anderson and about twenty of his men mounted their horses and chased their attackers across the field and through the federal line. Three hundred federal men hidden in the tree line opened fire. Captain Anderson and 10 of his men were killed.

LOCATION AND DRIVING DIRECTIONS

Located north of Orrick, MO, in Ray County. From Hwy 210, turn north onto Route O (slightly west of Route Z into Orrick) and then turn east onto the first gravel road, just before the railroad overpass. Go past three houses and then make a hard left and drive about halfway up the bluff. A private home is at the top of the hill. The isolated battlefield is a narrow strip of land located between a deep ditch and the road. You can see the monument from the road.

OF SPECIAL NOTE

This monument is in a tiny cemetery that includes four civilian headstones. It also (reportedly) includes the unmarked graves of all of the Partisan Rangers who died there except for "Bloody" Bill Anderson, who is buried in Pioneer Cemetery in Richmond, MO.

Thank you to Charles Childs, member of the Round Table and retired Union Pacific railroad man, for these extraordinary photographs of the "Shiloh Train" that came through our region on Monday and Tuesday, March 26th and 27th. It was pulled by vintage steam locomotive 844 and picked up Civil War reenactors at Union Station on Tuesday morning about 8:00 a.m. Charles also went to Kansas City, Kansas to take pictures on Monday as it rolled through the prairie. You will note that cannons are loaded on flatcars to accompany the soldiers. Charles says that they even got off a little earlier than expected from Union Station as they headed east through the northern part of Independence, passing through the heart of the Battle of the Little Blue at Ripley Junction, going on to Lake City and Buckner before settling in for a journey to Malta Bend where they made a stop before arriving in St. Louis to spend the night on the train. As participant Jim Beckner said, "This is a once in a lifetime experience."
