<u>THIS WEEK IN THE WAR</u>: Cutberth Mockbee of Harrisonville, MO hosted a birthday ball for his daughter, Martha, in October 1861. Attending were Cole and Sally Younger. When Sally was asked for a dance by Union Capt. Irvin Walley, he did not heed her refusal. Cole intervened and a heated exchange was followed by Walley drawing his pistol on Cole. This resulted in Cole's taking to the brush and joining up with Quantrill. See Cass County Folk Life Festival, Oct. 1, 2011 for dance reenactment.

President's Letter

I have been watching, or should I say re-watching, Ken Burns' documentary *The War*. An excellent presentation of World War II and the effect it had on the civilian population. If I take nothing else from this film I now understand that no one, absolutely no one remained unaffected by that war. No matter who you were or where you were the war changed your life. So I began to think: Did the American Civil War effect the civilian population to the same extent as World War II?

Based upon my limited research and given the limited space I can only present the following:

- Of the 31 states and 12 territories, only 10 did not have a campaign, battle, engagement or skirmish
- Of the 31 states and 12 territories all recorded casualties

From this we know that 75 per cent of the states and territories had combat of some type occur within their borders and all of them knew of the price to be paid for this war. It would seem that everyone within the United or Confederate States knew someone who had been included on the casualty lists. How could they not, especially when entire town of men of military age would enlist and serve in the same unit? Can you imagine waiting outside the newspaper office or the post office just to read the latest list of killed, wounded or missing. What a place of sadness.

I know this wasn't the only way the Civil War changed the lives of the civilian population, but it is the most personal. There were 1,030,000 casualties (dead, wounded or missing in action) in the Civil War; 3% of the population. How could the war not affect you?

World War II had 1,106,559 American casualties (dead, wounded or missing in action); 0.8% of the population.

Like World War II the Civil War was also fought internationally. I leave it to you to find out where.

Civil War in Newspapers

You have no doubt been following the series of Civil War 150 articles in the Kansas City Star which culminated on August 28th when Mike Calvert was interviewed for the story on the Jabez Smith mass burial called "Racing to save hallowed lands," Barbara **Hughes'** interpretation of Laura Flannery, the woman who walked to Texas, was cited in the article about the descendant of Laura who had five relatives buried in the "Six-man Cemetery," Shane Seley from Wide Awake Films was shown in costume while filming at the Battle of Wilson's Creek, **Del** and **Jean Warren** of James Country Mercantile provided period dress for the photographs of "Dressing the Part," and David Blight, one of the speakers at the Civil War symposium at the Mid-Continent Library earlier this year, wrote an essay called "Civil War at 150 – The Past in the Present?"

The Independence *Examiner* reminds us that the exhibit at the Truman Library called "Steamboats to Steam Engines: George Caleb Bingham's Missouri, 1819-1879" runs through September 8, 2011. Hours are 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday and Noon to 5:00 p.m. on Sunday. Admission is \$8 for adults, \$7 for seniors 65 and older, \$3 for children ages 6-15 and free for children 5 and under. This is your last opportunity to see one of the two existing Bingham paintings of "Order No. 11" before it goes back to Columbia, Missouri.

David Jackson, curator of the Jackson County Archives, wrote an interesting column in the August 20-22, 2011 issue of the *Examiner* called "Civil War letters tell the story." The "story" is about Upton Hays and his wife Margaret who buried in the Boone-Hays Cemetery on 63rd Street in Kansas City (no doubt another memorial we ought to include in our second "Monuments" book).

Hays was a great-grandson of Daniel Boone and was commissioned a cavalry captain in the Confederate Army. He was shot in the foot at the First Battle of Independence and six days later fought at the Battle of Lone Jack. He died at the Battle of Newtonia, Missouri. Between 1852 and 1872, Margaret Hays wrote letters to her parents in California. These and other documents were recently donated to the Jackson County Archives.

Jeff Martin, reporter for the *Examiner*, sought the help of Mary Potter, president of the Blue Springs Historical Society, to "Take a tour of city's rich history" in the August 27-29 issue. You may have read that the historical society is attempting to save the old Chicago & Alton Railroad Depot. They have already been successful in saving the Chicago & Alton Hotel which was moved to the society's property at 15th and Main streets. Beverly Shaw was interested to read that the Burrus Old Mill Park on Woods Chapel Road where she and her husband walk their miniature Schnauzers dates from 1825 when settlers stayed at this site before crossing the plains to Santa Fe. Mary would like to see the City of Blue Springs' historical district enlarged to include Burrus Old Mill Park, the Lobb Cemetery which Barbara Hughes brings to life in her interpretation of Mary Lobb, the Morgan Walker Family Cemetery adjacent to the James Lewis Elementary School, and the Blue Springs Cemetery. Some of those buried at the Blue Springs Cemetery are Moses Branton, a Confederate soldier who served under Stonewall Jackson and James W. Goodloe, one of Quantrill's raiders.

The Kansas City *Star* carried an article from Kimberly Hefling of the Associated Press on August 27, 2011 called "Old Guard's night duty." It's about the mission of the Old Guard, which is the Army's official ceremonial unit, to photograph more than 219,000 grave markers and 43,000 sets of cremains at Arlington National Cemetery in order to account for every grave and to update and digitize the cemetery's maps. They are doing this at night to escape the heat and to not interfere with the average of 27 funerals daily. The project is called Task Force Christman in honor of Pvt. William Christman of Easton, PA, who died in the Civil War and was the first soldier buried at Arlington.

Near Sprgfld, Mo Aug 17, 1861

Dear Margaret,

All is well here. Morale is high among our troops and feel confident of future success for our cause. We whipped the Dutch at Carthage on July 5th and Lyon and his Federals at Wilson's' Creek just last week. We feel one or two more victories and we can secure the state for our cause and restore Gov Jackson to his position as lawful Gov. Rumor has it that "Old Pap Price" will move north in the very near future. Not sure where we would engage the enemy, possibly Lexington, Boonville, Jeff City, where ever the enemy will be found.

Hope all is well with you and the boys, give them my love and hopefully this war will be over soon and I can return home.

Your loving husband Alexander

The above letter is fictitious however it is what you would expect at this stage of 1861. The characters are real. Alexander Griffith was a prosperous merchant from Dayton, Cass Co, Mo, his wife Margaret remained in Dayton when he went off to war. When the war broke out he immediately cast his lot with Gl Rains, VIII Div, MSG, assigned to the Quartermaster Corp and would have been present at both the above battles. He would serve throughout the war surrendering with his troops, the 10th Missouri Cav in Ark when the war concluded. His family would suffer the horrors of war, the burnings, killings etc that accompanied this American tragedy.


