The bombardment of Fort Sumter on April 12, 1861 was the opening engagement of the American Civil War. The countdown to the 150th Anniversary on April 12, 2011 is just 790 days away, as of the date of our next Round Table meeting on February 11th.

I've been travelling again and, again my being out of town coincided with our monthly meeting. For those of us unable to make the January meeting I understand we missed a good one. The annual open Round Table is my favorite. However, as I have been fortunate to do in the past I was able to mix business with pleasure when I must travel.

This time my travels took me to Perry, GA. If you take time to look it up you will find that Perry is about an hour and a half south of Atlanta located in the middle of peanut, cotton and pulp wood country. But more importantly, because if I were to relate stories about peanuts, cotton and pulp wood we would all be taking a nap right now, Perry is located just 30 minutes northeast of Andersonville, GA. Anyone, even those who may just be beginning their study of the Civil War knows about Andersonville. Now, before I get too far I know that Andersonville was not the only prison where the treatment of prisoners was inhumane. There are certainly Union prisons that were every bit as inhumane.

I don't want to talk about the prison so if you want to know more about that, you may want to look it up. There are several books and of course the National Park Service web site that will give you the history. I want to talk about the museum/visitor's center that was built to honor all POW's from all wars and to educate the public about their story. The story told through the use of first hand accounts, pictures and artifacts is informational, compelling, heart racing and heart stopping. The very human story of the prisoners is one of courage, determination and the unstoppable will of the human spirit to survive. As I walked through the exhibits I looked at the pictures and read the stories but, what made me really stop were the many artifacts that have been donated. From the rings carved from soup bones to the wooden clogs or hemp sandals made by the prisoners. Items made to cure boredom in the case of the rings or to make life a bit more livable as in the shoes. It's not really the items that made me stop but, the fact that each prisoner saved that item after they were released. These things were so precious that the prisoner kept and preserved them. I have no way of knowing exactly why. I can only guess that each item helped that prisoner maintain his humanity under conditions designed to be anything but human. The items were the only thing that that prisoner could call his own; everything else was given or taken away by his captors.

If you get the chance go to Andersonville, GA see the museum, look at the exhibits and study the artifacts. Each has a very human story to tell. Remember as you walk through it, the museum is not only telling the story of the conditions prisoners endured but, the story of the unconquerable human spirit.

SHPO Is 40 Years Old

The Missouri State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) is celebrating its 40th anniversary. It was created by the State Park Board (now the Department of Natural Resources' Division of State Parks) on July 1, 1968. Its underlying mission is to identify, document and seek to preserve Missouri's rich cultural heritage and historic places. It is SHPO which first vets our application for the Little Blue Battlefield to be added to the National Register of Historic Places. Mike Calvert reports that our application is almost complete and just needs an inventory of dwellings in the target area with a photograph, address and brief description. It's a two person project – one to drive and one to document and take photos. If you can volunteer some time for this, please call Mike at (816) 898-2603.

The current issue of *Missouri Resources* also announces that property has been acquired for the new Island Mound Civil War site near Butler, Missouri. The skirmish or *Battle of Island Mound* occurred on October 29, 1862, when approximately 30 black troops were ambushed by rebel horsemen near a low hill known as Island Mound. An archeological assessment will begin this winter, followed by the conceptual development plan process, then design and development. The dedication target is October 29, 2012, the 150th anniversary of the battle. This is thought to be the first time black soldiers engaged in combat during the Civil War.

Civil War Resources

Our friend Ted Stillwell wrote a story about the "Shake Rag" church (now the Lobb Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Blue Springs, Missouri) in the January 21, 2009 issue of the *Independence Examiner*. The church and Lobb Cemetery are well-known as pioneer landmarks in eastern Jackson County. Our member, Chuck Townsend, works with the Lobb Cemetery Association to preserve this landmark. Ted says that one explanation for the nickname of the church came from the fact that the proud ladies of the day were great seamstresses and wore their finest homemade dresses to church each Sunday – thus "Shake Rag."

An interesting book review of *Frontier Medicine:* From the Atlantic to the Pacific, 1492-1941 by

David Dary appeared in the January 18, 2009 issue of the *Kansas City Star*. Dary writes that the Civil War was a turning point for American medicine because it gave surgeons a lifetime's worth of onthe-job training. Dentistry was still ignored by the Army at the time, but Dary notes that "recruits were turned away if they did not have six opposing upper and lower front teeth with which to bite off the end of the powder cartridges used with muzzle-loaded weapons."
