Special Program by Dr. William Piston

Jim Beckner has made arrangements for us to hear a Civil War scholar and teacher who will be in our area in November. Dr. William Piston has taught in the History Department of Missouri State University (Springfield) since 1988. He specializes in military history and the Civil War and Reconstruction. In addition to his teaching and research, he is also the webmaster for the Civil War Round Table of the Ozarks.

Historic Preservation Day at Linwood Lawn

For those interested in the preservation of buildings, there will be a unique opportunity on Saturday, November 14, 2009, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. to visit Linwood Lawn at Lexington, Missouri, and participate in a program sponsored by the Lexington Historic Preservation Commission. Linwood Lawn is a 26 room mansion built in 1850 in the Italianate style and is rarely open to the public. Speakers include Susan Richards Johnson and Angie Gaebler, this region's foremost preservation architects; Kate Kocyba, art historian, archaeologist and author; Cydney Millstein, preservation consultant, architectural historian and author; and Abigail Tempel, civic leader and regional history enthusiast. Battle of Westport and "Martial Law" at Union Station

On November 17, 2009, at 6:00 p.m., Dr. Timothy Westcott, associate professor of history at Park University in Parkville, Missouri, will be exploring Kansas City's Civil War history by examining George Caleb Bingham's famous engraving "Martial Law" based on the infamous General Order No. 11. Dr. Wescott is a graduate of Avila College, UMKC, and Union Institute (Cincinnati,

Ohio) with a doctorate in history in 2002. He has presented papers on topics related to Kansas and Missouri history at numerous local, regional and national conferences. His presentation will be in Union Station's Town Hall.

Civil War Santa

It was Christmas 1862 when Thomas Nast was asked by his editor to illustrate the poem "A Visit with St. Nicholas." America was embroiled in the armed conflict of the Civil War, the darkest hour the nation had ever known. On January 3, 1863, Nast illustrated Santa visiting the Union troops on the cover of *Harper's Weekly*. Jim Two Crows Wallen, dressed as the Nast Santa, will use actual letters and diaries from soldiers, wives, parents, and children to describe the Christmases during this most difficult time. His presentation will be at the Grandview Library on December 3, 2009, at 10:00 a.m.

Abraham Lincoln Statue Unveiling

On December 3, 1859, Abraham Lincoln spoke at Stockton Hall in Leavenworth, Kansas, in a move that signified the importance of Kansas in the continuing struggle against slavery. The importance of Kansas as a Free State evolved into the foundation upon which he conducted his presidential campaign. As a tribute to Lincoln's visit to Leavenworth and the important role the city and the state of Kansas played in our country's history, an 8' Lincoln statue will be unveiled on December 3, 2009, 150 years later. It will be held at 5:00 p.m. at the Leavenworth City Hall, 5th and Shawnee, Leavenworth, Kansas.

Lincoln in Leavenworth and Kansas

On December 10, 2009, at 7:00 p.m., historian Carol Ayres will be speaking at the Frontier Army Museum at Fort Leavenworth about Lincoln's time in Leavenworth and Kansas. She is the author of *Lincoln and Kansas: A Partnership for Freedom* (Sunflower University Press, 2001). Admission is free, but you will need to arrive 15 minutes early and bring picture identification (driver's license or passport) to get on post. The Museum is located at 100 Reynolds Avenue, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

Congress Allocates \$9 Million to Preserve Battlefields

In a press release dated October 28, 2009, Jim Lighthizer of the Civil War Preservation Trust said that it was welcome news that the \$9 million funding request for endangered Civil War battle-field preservation was accepted in the Interior Appropriations bill. Mr. Lighthizer will be addressing the Civil War Round Table of Kansas City on November 17th.

One of the sponsors, Senator Webb, said that "As America prepares for the 150th anniversary commemoration of the Civil War, it is more important than ever that we preserve these landmarks for future generations to learn about the history of our nation."

Senator Alexander concurred, saying, "The Civil War was a heartbreaking time in our history that we should never forget. Protecting our Civil War battlefields and historic sites is important both to honor the thousands who fought and to allow future generations to learn their heritage by visiting sites like Shiloh, Lookout Mountain, Fort Donelson and Parker's Crossroads. I'm glad to see that this funding was included to support this important program."

Lighthizer also stressed that the upcoming 150th anniversary of the Civil War presents an ideal time to redouble efforts to protect this hallowed ground. "I can think of no more fitting – and lasting – tribute during this sesquicentennial commemoration than to preserve the places where these brave soldiers fought and bled."
